Playground aggression

Police were called to the new children's playground over the weekend when parents and a representative of the Bowling Club were unable to persuade a gang of children to stop behaving aggressively on the playground equipment and throwing water

Less than a month after the grand opening of the children's playground, some parents are having reservations about taking their children there to play.

According to the parents of children who use the park, a group of children thought to be aged between 9 and 14 years are frequently engaging in rough and aggressive behaviour at the playground. Some of the younger park patrons are frightened and unable to enjoy the equipment when the older children are

"They just took over the equipment, they were throwing water bombs and running up the slippery dips and generally forcing the smaller children off the equipment," one mother of two young children told The GoodTimes.

"The park is great, but when the big kids turn up it's time to leave. My boys get scared and want to go home," she also said. Constable Tracy Linton, who

was one of the police officers who attended the scene over the weekend said, "There were about five kids with water bombs. We just told them to pull their heads in. They weren't being too bad, just silly."

However, in another report from earlier on the same day a mother of two young children described seeing the same group of children physically fighting one another at the park. "It was like some weird, prepubescent version of 'Fight Club', the woman said.

The woman told the children that violent behaviour was not acceptable in 'Peace' park or in front of small children. She was taunted by the group that she could go and call the police if it bothered her.

One young member of the group allegedly had his pants pulled down and was being verbally humiliated by the others.

Another community member commented to The GoodTimes, "What we have here is the next generation starting to flex their little muscles. They need to be shown that the community will not tolerate anti-social behaviour. They need to understand that before we lose another generation to drug-abuse, violence and greed."

Assault victim recovering

There have been no new breakthroughs in the investigation into the assault that took place in Nimbin on 5th June, in which two Ballina tradesmen were injured, one seriously.

'We are following a number of lines of inquiry which are of a sensitive nature,' said Senior Constable Tim McCabe, who is conducting the investigation into the assault. 'However, at this stage no arrests have been made,' he said.

Police are still appealing to the public to come forward with any information that may assist them in their investigation.

Meanwhile, word on the street is that two young men who were thought to be under suspicion for committing the crime have fled interstate.

'It's a shame they are not in gaol, but at least they're not in Nimbin,' one long time local told The GoodTimes,

a sentiment that appears to have been widely echoed throughout the community.

Misinformation currently in circulation is that the two men entered Rainbow Lane and provoked the attack. In fact, the attack took place out the front of the Hemp Embassy. And according to one of the victims, was totally unprovoked.

Gary Harte, who suffered a brain injury as a result of the attack, has recently been released from a Gold Coast hospital. The 41 year-old Ballina father is recuperating at his mother's house.

Mrs Harte said it will be a long and slow recovery for her son, and it is still not known how much of his head injury will be permanent.

Ballina painters have held a second fund raising event to assist Gary Harte's family with the ongoing financial burden of his care and treatment.


