ee a snake and not know what to do? Te-Iwa Bedggood says leave it alone and phone him.

"You learn to respect a snake," Te-Iwa says, recalling that over the years he has been "nipped" by a black snake, and a brown snake spat on his daughter's leg.

The heavily tattooed, friendly Maori gentleman has 26 years experience handling snakes and knows how to care for and sensitively relocate them. His experience was hard earned, keeping his house safe in far north Queensland and working out how to be good at it – by learning how they behave. "In the mornings they're sluggish, but once they warm up they can be pretty lively - well into the evening," he said. "It's best to deal with them in the mornings."

He deals with venomous snakes with a jig, involving a taut piece of string on the forked end of a pole, which is looped around the snake's head from a distance. The most dangerous snakes common here to watch out for are the brown snake, which can drop from trees, and the death adder, which coils up in

By comparison, the redbellied black snake and tiger snake are relatively benign for venomous varieties. Rarely, a coastal taipan also gets far into the hinterland, and they are one of the deadliest and most aggressive snakes in the



a collection of locally-caught specimens in jars, which confirm that our valley hosts snakes on the move from other regions, so advanced skills in identification are definitely a pre-requisite before any intervention with a snake is contemplated. "Most snakes will keep away from you," Te Iwa said.

Because snakes are territorial, having a nonvenomous snake take up residence at your place has its advantages, making it less likely that other venomous snakes will move in.
