A wolf in black sheep's clothing?

he charade and circus that is the US Election cycle has reached its agonizing finale. The illusion of democracy remains stark. No matter who Americans vote for, they can only elect a war monger and secret representative of the Wall Street corporate oligarchs.

Americans seem only ever to get stuck with war criminals and mass murderers as presidents or presidential aspirants. Bill Clinton ruthlessly bombed Iraq during the 1990's, enforcing a no-fly zone and sustaining a brutal embargo that killed over half a million Iraqi children. Obama has promised to bomb and destroy all "terrorists" in Afghanistan and Pakistan, where the "good" war must continue to be fought. As for McCain, he has already bombed a nation as a soldier decades ago.


Decent Americans just want a taste of democracy for once. They are sick of their politicians serving the interests of corporate criminals and the industrial military complex, while destroying their legitimate aspirations, hopes, dreams and needs, ripping them off blind, and erecting a corporate fascist police state around them. Decades of bold and relentless US hegemonic aggression worldwide has normalised a permanent state of war and conquest

In the minds of many Americans, but more people than ever are beginning to see through the game. And this, despite the powerful, bewildering and relentless media censorship that operates within the USA. The spin doctors have been successful in creating the Obama phenomenon. He is a talented orator, and his overall disposition appears compact, resolute and disciplined. Indeed, in comparison with the belligerent and oafish Bush and McCain, Obama appears dignified and serene.

No doubt, he is a more decent man than McCain and Bush, who are unapologetically atavistic and even more shamelessly subservient to the Wall Street mafia. But even if Obama suddenly became a saint, he has accepted so much campaign money from Wall Street that no matter what good he might seek to do, his hands are well and truly tied.

Many have been fooled by Obama's smooth and slick approach, and by the charade of the two party circus in America. In Obama, the power brokers who run America have made a very clever choice. He appears to be the change honest decent people are thirsting for. But people need to watch him closely, and actually listen to his words, his ambitions, his promises, and the caveats he places upon those promises.

Obama's aspirations and actions will be dictated by those who bought him during and prior to the election campaign, and he will be different to Bush only in personality. Even the rhetoric is largely the same.

In fact, in many areas, Obama seeks to go further than Bush. He laments that the US "has lost Latin America," and, describing the democratically elected governments of Venezuela, Bolivia and Nicaragua as a "vacuum to be filled," promises interference in these countries. He supports the criminal Uribe regime in Colombia, and asserts its right to launch military raids across its borders. He has also expressed a desire to pull Mexico into line using the Colombian model adopted by previous Washington regimes, and, in language more expansionist and ambitious even than George Bush's, announced that in South America: "We must press further south as well."

As for the Palestinian question, even the Bush regime recognizes the UN designation of Jerusalem as an international city to be shared, but on June 4th, Obama made the extraordinary promise at a conference of the Israel Public Affairs Committee of an "undivided Jerusalem."

"We lead the world in battling immediate evils and promoting the ultimate good," says Obama. "We must lead by building a 21st-century military... to advance the security of all people." Sounds familiar doesn't it? Obama says in pursuing "terrorists" he would attack Pakistan. As for the Iraq question, Obama now "reserves the right" to change his pledge to get troops out next year. "I will listen to our commanders on the ground," he says, creating his inevitable loop hole and escape route.

Obama's adviser on Iraq, Colin Kahl, has declared that the US should maintain up to 80,000 troops in Iraq until 2010. Like McCain, Obama has voted numerous times in the Senate in support of the Bush regime's request for an ever greater war chest for Iraq; and he has echoed Republican calls for an escalation of military actions and personel in Afghanistan, and for emphatic military interventions elsewhere in the region.



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Teeth, necks, feet and backs

ne would think from the title that I am all over the shop this month. Why should a Bowen Therapist who also practices basic kinesiology, pranic healing, remedial massage and emotional field therapy, but is not a dentist or podiatrist, be chatting about teeth and feet?

Well, if you have an on going and mysterious muscle or skeletal problem that keeps reoccurring, your practitioner is remiss if they haven't addressed those two parts of your anatomy to see if there is any malfunction in either or both of those areas.


Planting another tree would be the best of Christmas presents for mother earth and for ourselves.


As the evening drew to a conclusion the dancers exploded to life en force with the new wave sounds of Manifest.



From November 2007 to October 2008, club members enjoyed 27 walks. A further five were cancelled due to weather and one in respect for Peter. Member walks totalled 306 and

visitor walks 48 (many visitors became members) giving an average of 13 bodies per walk. We had nine leaders for these walks: Don Durrant (9), Martins (6), Michael Smith (4), Judy Hales (3) and five others with one. Top attendance was Ron Ronan who did 22 walks.

Current membership is 50 and 2009 membership fees are now due at \$15/ head. We were established in October 2005 and affiliated with the NSW Federation of Bushwalking Clubs (which organises group insurance). We started walks in February 2006 and have since maintained a regular program of two weekend and one mid-week walk per month, including occasional camping weekends - one of which is planned for next month (see program for details). There will be no more club walks until February 2009.

By the time you read this our last walk for November and AGM and will be over, and we will have a new, enthusiastic committee ready to lead us into the great unknowns of 2009 and beyond.



Alas, our November 9th walk through Don Durrant's Afterlee rainforest was cancelled due to rain. But the sun came out long enough on November 16 for Ron Ronan to lead 11 brave souls along the Casino-Byron railway track and through the depths of the Burringbar Tunnel - built way back in the 1890s. The walk started a couple of kilometres out of Stokers Siding beside a great timber bridge. Unfortunately the state of the track and bridge is such that a complete reconstruction would be needed before we could enjoy a functioning rail service again - perhaps the blessed Kevin 07 could fling some infra-structure money this way (think peak oil, global warming, global recession etc, Saint Kevin). Alas, that prayer is probably pie in the sky, flying pigs stuff. But more seriously the way must be kept in public ownership as a track for horse riders, walkers and bicycle riders.



Making the hard yards at sea Knockout pair

'n between all the bad weather, with strong winds and big seas, the Nimbin Heads Fishing Team managed one trip to sea this month, with Pix, Cal, Zac, Ryan, Arrow, Chris, Huen and first-timer Pommy Chris getting a lucky break in the weather.

Fishing out of Wooli, we first came across a school of kingfish about 20 kilometres out. We were using live slimy mackerel for bait, and seeing the kingies on the sounder, we were confident of some good hook-ups. But the fish were not on the bite and it was a long start to the morning, with hardly any current and the barometer dropping.

An hour later Huen landed our first small kingie, and Arrow an even smaller one, which went back. The livies were active but it wasn't happening. After two hours we still had only one fish.

With hardly any current, we decided to go wide and chase samson fish. An hour later we stopped on a reef

and could see a shitload of fish on the sounder. This looked good. We were so wide we could not see land, and we were fishing deep. We put the pick down, dropped down our lines with a one-pound sinker and found the current was gushing and we couldn't hold bottom.

The only thing to do was pull up anchor and try to drift with twopound sinkers. With the wind blowing the same way as the current, if you didn't get a hook-up as soon as you hit bottom, it was too late. After each drift we would land one or two fish and find we would be about 5K off the reef.

So for 4 hours we kept doing the same fast drift, and the fish were now coming in, with your humble fishing reporter and Chris both landing 7kg samson fish and Arrow and Huen landing a nice silver 5kg jewfish each, and Ryan and Cal landing a 4kg samson fish each.

Then after six hours of fishing,



Pommy Chris finally landed a samson fish which topped off his day at sea.

Nothing was easy catching fish that day, but that's fishing. It was great to be at sea again, and it makes you appreciate days when the Fish Gods are smiling upon you. So all in all we still landed about 60kg of fish and all ate fish for a few days.

Last month on a trip that I wasn't on (now that doesn't happen very often) the boys tell me Zac landed a huge snapper and manhandled it like it was a little pinky. Nice one, Zac.






