King's Forest

I am writing to express my concern at Leda Holdings' proposal to develop King's Forest south of Kingscliff for 4500 houses, which will lead to the inevitable extinction of the Tweed's largest colony of approximately 300 koalas.

Our poor koalas are under threat from so many areas – such as the drought, climate change, bushfires, floods, road kill, dogs etc. But more than anything, habitat destruction is their biggest threat.

I was shocked to learn that there are only 100,000 koalas remaining in the wild. Therefore we should be doing everything possible to protect this species. Queensland's Anna Bligh has made special efforts to protect whatever remaining koalas exist in the wild. Time for us in NSW too.

The King's Forest plans do not include anywhere near adequate protection for koalas who would be fatally impacted by the presence of dogs, four-laned highways and cars on what is euphemistically called the "wildlife corridor". Why can't these big developers see this simple fact or don't they care?

Chopping down trees that are currently food and shelter for koalas would not be wise considering that it would take at least a decade to grow new ones. In the meantime what are koalas supposed to eat?

I totally object to this land being developed period. Ideally it should become a wildlife reserve so the koalas can be left alone in peace. We have already destroyed so much of their habitat on the coast. How pathetic.

In the interests of our native animals, 40% of whom we have already driven extinct in just 200 years, I hope this proposal is rejected.

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Simon says...

The February council meeting was the first official council meeting of the new year, and it was very heartening as decisions were made which supported the concerns of many residents in our council area. I was successful in having some of my motions passed, unlike in the previous meeting.

For the Nimbin folk, the prolonged issue of the Nimbin Community Centre and the Lismore City Council's requirement to hold mortgage security for s94 grants was resolved in favour of the community centre. Diana Roberts presented an iconic and impassioned speech with the analogy of Mum and Dad helping their adult children buy a house, but requiring to keep the title themselves because they had a small amount invested and wanted to have final control over the property. My motion to the meeting that the Council NOT seek a mortgage over the title was passed 7 votes to 4. The Nimbin community should be acknowledged for its amazing effort in raising funds and managing the Community Centre over the years, and this decision by Council reflects our confidence in the community.

Cr Ray Houston moved to give the Blue Knob Hall Art Gallery a donation of \$2,616.20 being 30% of the Development Application, Construction Fee and s94 charges. This motion was accepted 7/4. Thinking of halls my guess is that there will be some halls in the local government area which won't be able to apply for or spend the \$5,000 Rudd money. Any hall committee with a project ready to go could be

in a very strong position to gain more funds. I'd just like to acknowledge the fabulous contribution local hall committees make to their communities.

The February meeting also addressed the very controversial Development Application by Champion's Quarry for a massive expansion of the quarry's capacity. The local residents had lobbied long and hard against the proposed development, with concerns including inadequacy of buffer zones, noise, dust, health risks, road safety and traffic impacts, flora and fauna concerns, and tourism impacts. There was a huge public gallery, the largest I have seen, and the degree of emotion in the Chamber was palpable, or was it simply that the air conditioning wasn't functioning properly and we were all 'boiling'. I moved the motion to reject the proposed development, not on any one issue, but on the combination of many concerns, but principally that Council would be acting against the provisions of its own Development Control Plan if it approved the development. The vote was 7 in favour of the motion to refuse the development, with 3 votes against, and Cr Meineke abstaining which meant by default he supported the development.

This decision was not taken lightly, and was certainly one of the biggest issues to face the council in recent times. We have read thousands of pages of reports, had a site inspection and workshops. Is it responsible to make a decision that may find the Council in the Land and Environment Court, with its associated costs? On the other hand, legal action by the resident group was likely if the development went ahead with similar cost implications. This was only one of the myriad of issues we considered. It was also very hard seeing the huge amount of work put in by council staff on this issue, but voting against their recommendation.

Champions rejected.

As most readers will know, Council at its February meeting, rejected the application (7 votes to 4) for an expansion of Champion's Quarry at Tucki Tucki. The non-functioning air conditioning combined with 100 people and standing room only in the Chamber added to the atmosphere.

While the community is naturally pleased with the decision, Council is expecting to be taken to the Land and Environment Court by the applicant so the battle may not be over.

Nimbin Community Centre

There was also good news for the Nimbin community with Council voting not to require the security of a mortgage over the Community Centre to protect its Section 94 contributions. While staff recommended that Council needed the protection of the mortgage in case things go pear-shaped for NCCI, Councillors were of the opinion that the community has demonstrated its good governance and commitment to the future of the site and were rewarded accordingly.

Blue Knob Gallery

Also good news for the Blue Knob Hall committee was the decision to donate \$2616.60 as a contribution of 30% of the fees and charges payable for the current development application for improvements. While not the entire amount sought, the money will certainly

assist this hard-working and energetic group of artists and community members.

Nimbin Caravan Park

The third 'local' item on Council's agenda for February was the management of the Nimbin Caravan Park and Pool complex. Since the previous manager left in June 2008, there has been an interim manager engaged through an employment agency. No tender was accepted at the meeting but Council staff will continue negotiations with three parties but a contract is expected to be finalised shortly.

Victorian Bushfires

At the start of the February meeting, those present honoured those who have lost lives, homes and livelihoods in the Victorian Bushfires. We also agreed to donate \$5000 to the Red Cross Bushfire Appeal. I know that Nimbin people have organised fundraisers and throughout the community, people have given so generously to help. Others in our Council area have travelled to Victoria to assist as fire fighters, Red Cross aid workers and as Centrelink staff. We hope they return safely to their loved ones and we thank them sincerely for their assistance in this disaster.

Community Consultation

Council has commenced the preparation of a new Community Consultation policy. We have held one workshop with the second planned on April 7. I understand that the Nimbin community is also looking at how community consultation can be improved and how Council and Nimbin people can work together more effectively. I look forward to hearing the outcomes and regret that I am unable to sit in on your deliberations.

Water Reform

Last year, the NSW Government commissioned an independent inquiry into the provision of urban water supply and sewerage services

in non-metropolitan areas. Like many Councils, Lismore lodged a submission. Of course that was in the term of the previous Council and so now that the report and recommendations have been released, the new Council needs to consider its position.

The report recommends a binding alliance of all NC Councils excluding Tweed and Clarence Valley. It also recommends that the total water cycle is contained within the new structure. As readers may know, the current structure of Rous Water does not include responsibility for sewerage services that are currently provided by individual Councils.

It would be fair to say that across NC Councils there is a wide range of views and coming to a consensus may be impossible.

Roads and Budget

Council has commenced its 09/10 budget process by having a presentation from staff on the state of our roads and the increasing gap between what we can deliver in the budget and the needs of both the rural and urban networks. Last year we spent 25% of our total budget or \$18m on roads, but of course the Roads budget also includes paths, cycleways, bridges, roadside maintenance and wages.

It is clear that our roads maintenance budget is under funded by \$2.75m and our capital works or construction budget is \$3m under what is required.

The reality is that this year's budget will be lean. Reduced and indeed lost revenue from investments combined with increases in costs including wages are the main constraints. There is also a need to recognise that the community is facing uncertain economic times and should not bear an increase in rates beyond the rate pegging limit set by the State government and expected to be less than 3%.

Having said that the budget will be lean, the community is invited to make submissions via a one page form available

from Council offices, the web or from me.

It is increasingly apparent that LCC is not alone in its incapacity to meet the demands of its ageing and failing infrastructure. The matter has been raised at the Federal government level through the Australian Council for Local Government. The hope is that local government in the future will receive increased Federal money perhaps through a share of the GST. Time will tell.

Workshops

Council tourism staff including Andrew from the Nimbin Visitor Information Centre, recently told us of the VIC's success. Over 200 visitors pop in to the Nimbin VIC each day making it one of the top 10 in the state.

The Nimbin VIC is more than an information centre. It sells local produce, has internet access and makes accommodation bookings. If readers are passing, take the opportunity to pick up the latest visitor information guide for Lismore, Nimbin and Villages. It is a great resource for all of us especially when we have visitors and want to know where we can go to show them some of our wonderful area.

As Nimbin's HEMP Embassy gears up for the village's seventeenth annual MardiGrass, a cannabis law reform protest weekend that has cost NSW taxpayers a fortune in recent years, an extraordinary situation is emerging in America. New Jersey has just become the 14th state to legislate for medical cannabis. Further, the Attorney General has just reassured law reformers the new government will be treating drugs as a health issue not a criminal one, as Obama promised pre election..

To tell us why California hasn't succumbed to psychosis after a decade of medical cannabis being available, Cheech and Chong are expected to visit, and to explain why the war on drugs can't be won, ex-cop and leader of LEAP, Law Enforcement Against Prohibition, a 10,000 strong group in America who just happen to share the hippy view of prohibition, will also be coming to this year's 'Wake Up Australia' MardiGrass.

Most events are well on the way to being organized. A weekend pass including a campsite at the A & I Showgrounds costs \$50. A Saturday-only pass costs \$20, Sunday \$10.

Volunteers of all sorts are still needed and we know from experience this is the way to really enjoy the weekend, from the inside. We especially need parking space and drug free drivers!

There's a new Hemp Olympix event planned for this year called 'Correct Weight'. Or 'Fair Deal' as some want to call it. Entrants have to estimate an oz weight in a standard cliplock bag. 28.349 grams



to be exact. It's a gold medal event and some are already practising.

Also this year for the first time there will be a Fringe MardiGrass, "The Red Pill Circus of Truth" hosted by Jago Jago. The proposed program will include guest speakers on various subjects that are taboo on the mainstream media. Subjects covered will be history, medicine, politics, finance, military and other relevant issues not normally discussed or made available to the general public, and will include film screenings from Friday evening to Sunday night.

One problem: If Cheech and Chong, Jack 'Clean' Cole AND Pink who may well be in Byron for the weekend, all come to MardiGrass this year, we definitely will need all the parking we can find.

The "Wake Up Australia" MardiGrass this year is on the weekend of May 2 and 3, and organisers gather in the Hemp Bar every Friday at 5, if you want to join in and help. Otherwise drop into the Embassy or the Hemp Bar anytime and leave a message in the 'pink book'.
