Nimbin Volunteer Bushfire Brigade has been active since the early 1950s. Our volunteers are all community members and are trained in remote access, village and bush firefighting. Brigade volunteers are invaluable on the fireline. Nimbin Brigade attends all emergency incidents involving fire, road accidents and good will calls. We also monitor fire permits during the fire season and underake hazard reduction burns for asset protection (forestry/ housing) and agricultural purposes. Permit season is now over until later this year, however please contact the Brigade (phone 6689-1221) if you have any concerns before you burn.

Nimbin community relies on the professional service and quick response of brigade members in emergency situations. The community also supports the brigade by participating as either active or auxillary members. This weekend seven new Nimbin members undertook Bushfirefighter Training at Yorklea Fire Control Centre. With the support and experience of fire-seasoned Nimbin brigade members, these seven new chums are extending the capacity of Nimbin emergency services. Meeting the first Wednesday each month, the Nimbin brigade is open to all community members willing to undertake sponsored professional training with the Rural Fire Service. There is a strong network of Brigade support within the Nimbin community and neighbouring hamlets who rely on our bush and village trained firefighters.

Nimbin Volunteer Bushfire Brigade is located on emergency services land in Sibley Street. We meet here for regular meetings and whenever we respond to an emergency call. As such it is important for active brigade members to be able to quickly access Brigade property with their own authorised vehicles. Private cars, buses and vans that park in the driveway and grassed areas impede access and egress for emergency service personnel and vehicles. As amusing as it may sound to some to see a car nudged out of the way by 12 tonne of firetruck, it also slows Brigade response time. Private vehicles are unlikely to be insured for damage incurred when parked on emergency service land. So please observe the 'emergency service access' signage when it arrives.

Success again for Nimbin Brigade from the recent FaHCSIA Volunteer Grant enabling the purchase of new equipment. High powered backpack leaf blowers have proven to be a great success for brigades operating on the urban rural interface. Coupled with a new hose reel addition to our first response vehicle – Nimbin 1 Alpha – Nimbin find themselves better equipped for grass and forest fires as well as hazard reduction and structural fires.

### Hot topics fire up Northern Greens in Nimbin

Detailed evidence of corruption in local government and the total failure of the Federal Government or the Opposition to manage our nation's water assets, health system or preparation for

nation's water assets, health system or preparation for climate change topped the table of issues at a regional meeting of The Greens held at Nimbin in February.

Representatives from Tweed Greens, Ballina Greens, Byron Greens, Northern Rivers and Clarence Greens stayed the weekend and had a great time.

The Greens regularly hold regional meetings to coordinate campaign strategies. This year, the party is fired up to fight Federal and State election campaigns building on the work that Green councillors in Tweed, Lismore, Byron



and Ballina have done, exposing the lacklustre leadership of the older parties.

One of the highlights of the weekend conference is the toolkit that has been established for rooting out corruption in local government. With the success of the Democracy4Sale website established to track developer donations to State government politicians, the party has established a reputation for putting entrenched politicians that try to feather their own

nests, on the line.

"Accountability is one of the cornerstones of democracy and local governments have got away without close scrutiny because there has been no organised opposition," said Terry Morgan, the Convenor of the Tweed Greens. "All that is about to change."

The regional meeting also resolved to use the Freedom of Information legislation and the resources of its elected representatives to unearth reports into management of forests, feral animals and weeds that have

been suppressed for various reasons.

With Northern NSW sometimes described as the weed capital of Australia, the collapse of managed investment services and the tax advantages given to forestry companies over farmers, these issues are of intense interest to local farmers as well as environmentalists.

The Nationals and The Greens have joined forces on a number of issues recently, especially the rights of coal companies to mine prime agricultural land on the Liverpool Plains.

The process of selecting candidates for the Federal Election this year was formally commenced at the meeting, and it is expected that the party will select candidates for the Federal seats of Richmond and Page before May this year.

### Enviro film for No Rally Group fundraiser

Thelocal'NoRallyGroup(NRG)has nearly reached its first anniversary. Concerned locals started this action group in response to the Special Events Legislation and the running of 'Repco Rally Australia' through

our beautiful home of the Green Caldera.

At NRG's request, Tweed Shire Greens Councillor, Katie Milne,

Katie Milne, challenged the Repco Rally in court as a last minute attempt to stop it from going ahead.

The challenge

was dismissed and Katie was then hit with legal costs of about \$25,000. During the rally madness last September, several activists ended up with smaller fines as well. Another \$8,000 has to be paid for an independent environmental impact study.

Fundraising has been very successful so far. This film night will be one of Nimbin's contributions. The Rainforest Information Centre has generously offered to match dollar-for-dollar the proceeds of the night (up to \$1000). The 'Radical Fairies' offered their exceptional catering skills, while Djangbung Gardens and the Nimbin Environment Centre promise clerical and other

assistance.

It is going to be a fun night, at Nimbin Town Hall on Friday 19th March, with 'no rally' short films, auction and comedy, in addition to the main highlight 'The Age of Stupid', a full-length climate change awareness film from the UK, starring Pete Postlewaite.

Doors will open at 6 pm. Tickets are now available for \$10 at Perceptio and Nimbin Environment Centre. Meals, finger food, cakes, hot and cold drinks will be on sale.

## Irresponsible IV users bring end to regeneration project

Nimbin Central School's involvement in the Mulgum Creek Regeneration has had to be cut short due to the inconsiderate and dangerous disposal of syringes by users.

About 30 students from Years 3-4-5-6 had been engaged in a water catchment study and regeneration project coordinated by Moksha from the Community Gardens. The program included studying the natural contours of the land to determine the flow of rainwater runoff. It also included digging swales (trenches) to help direct the water flow and maximise the retention of water for use in the gardens.

Stage 2 of the project involved regeneration of parts



of Mulgum Creek, removal of weeds and planting of natives. Unfortunately the student's involvement had to be terminated at this point.

Concern was raised when students began to uncover

black boxes distributed to I.V. drug users. When the discarded needles were found buried in the soil and carelessly thrown into the long grass, all children's

activity had to cease. Assistant Principal Marc Everingham said, "Such irresponsible and dangerous behaviour not only puts our children at risk but it also cut short their involvement in a well-planned project that would have benefited the community and the environment."

Also put on hold was the students' documentation of their work on the project through photos, illustrations and poetry which were to be compiled into a book for the community.

### "Belle Ville" Nimbin

hank you for printing the photo (last month) of the removal of our home of 50 years which was situated on the property (farm) known as "Belle Ville", Nimbin which was owned by Bert and Myra (nee Stewart) Faulks from 1939 until 1989 when it was sold following the death of my father.

The two-storeyed house in Cullen Street, Nimbin (previously known as "Main Street") was owned by my grandparents, Charles and Eleanor Stewart from the early 1900's and was named "Belle Court". It was built by Eleanor's father, Oliver Jones (my Great Grandfather) circa 1890.

"Belle Court" was used as a private home and a hospital until 1933 when the Nimbin C.W.A. Hospital was opened, which in turn became the Nimbin Hospital and which now forms part of the Nimbin Community Hospital complex.

After "Belle Court" ceased to be used as a hospital, it was used for a variety of purposes such as a boarding house, by a visiting dentist, by solicitors and a music teacher.

In 1939, my mother and father, my brother John (2) and myself (4) lived in the top storey of "Belle Court", moving to the ground floor when the top storey was being removed.

Because the wooden piers of "Belle Court" were starting to sink, my grandfather (Charles Stewart) decided (in 1939) to remove the top storey and use the timber to build a house for his daughter Myra and her husband, Bert Faulks on the portion of his farm adjoining the village of Nimbin known as "Belle Ville".

My parents, my brother and myself moved into the re-built house on "Belle Ville" towards the end of 1939. My parents bought the 88 acre farm from my grandfather and farmed it as a dairy farm for 50 years.

"Belle Court" in Cullen Street remained with the Stewart family descendants until it was sold in 2005.

You may also be interested to know that the Nimbin Showground, the Nimbin Bowling green, the Nimbin Swimming Pool and the Nimbin Caravan Park were all part of Charles Stewart's farm.

"Cecil Street, Nimbin" is named after Charles' son, No. 2499 Private Cecil James Stewart of the 49<sup>th</sup> Battalion who was Killed in Action in the Battle of Dernancourt, France on 5<sup>th</sup> April, 1918, aged 23 and is buried in the Dernancourt War Cemetery.

In November, 2009 my husband and I visited his grave during our tour of the Western Front.




