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Metgasco **Open Day**

Metgasco CEO Peter Henderson and his staff were eager to show everyone how safe, harmless and profitable CSG is during a Metgasco open day in January. There were nice (if simplistic and misleading) diagrams and pictures on the walls, including a few of Mr Henderson drinking the Metgasco pond water. Interestingly though, the pictures didn't show him drinking the water at many different times, but rather many different angles of the one and only time he did that stunt.

He was asked to explain the statement by gas proponents that a gas shortage will lead to blackouts in NSW, given that BHP has claimed there is enough gas in Bass Strait to last a thousand years and that coal is the main source of power generation in NSW? Mr Henderson's explanation was virtually a bob each way: yes, there is an urgent demand for more gas to power our needs, but the 30MW plant Metgasco crowed about for five years was no longer needed because of a drop in demand. Then he blurted out the truth: "For the moment we need to concentrate on export."

When asked directly whether locallyproduced CSG would be available for local use, he explained that he foresaw that "in the future" the price of gas in NSW would rise due to shortages, to an extent where it would become profitable for CSG to be sold here. While the



gas continues to fetch a higher price at export, that is where it will be sold. Clearly the intention is not to provide cheap gas to locals, but to rip them off for maximum profit.

Concerns stressed by one young woman, that her hard-won home and sustainable lifestyle could be devalued by a gas well next door, were brushed aside. "There will be losers and winners," he coldly admitted. What he didn't add was that there would be more losers than winners, in fact lots more; like 99.9% maybe!

And when challenged that the creation of a few jobs as a result of CSG will be outmatched by decline in the tourism industry among others? He flatly denied there was such a thing as a tourism industry in Richmond Valley. He has apparently never heard about the

remarkable wetlands of the Richmond Valley and its unique birdlife. He seemed unaware that the fishing industry in Gladstone had collapsed as a result of the construction of LNG plants there.

As for a social licence, Mr Henderson is adamant that this is the prerogative of the government. A government that promised at the last election, "No ifs or buts, there will be no CSG wells near any water supply" – a promise broken many times over. It would appear Mr Henderson has his snout buried deep in the trough, and that stops him from seeing reality.

So if you're not convinced that CSG is a real threat to life and lifestyle, then go find out from the horse's mouth. Metgasco plans another open day and more spin in the next few weeks – be there.

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Githubal vow to stay firm at Cedar Point

What became obvious as Kevin, Rob Williams Snr., Bonnie and many other Original men and women spoke in January at a third meeting supporting the Githubal's fight to save their sacred men's site at Cedar Point, was that their patience was at an end, and that their Law and Lore was now presiding in-country.

It was extremely hot, the wind was more than unpleasant and the grass had not been mowed. Even though there were plenty of reasons not to attend, more than 80 people answered the call to stand beside the Githubal in this struggle to reclaim such an important part of their heritage.

Of all the recent insults, what galls the Githubal most is the blatant double standards at play with the Cedar Point application for a massive quarry. The Heritage Report commissioned by the developers acknowledge this is a sacred men's site, mistakenly concedes there are three scarred trees (there are 15) that complement this holy place, and just as importantly, concede ceremonial contact with this place through the presence and rituals conducted by Alex Vesper, continued until quite recently.

Then to compound the insult and indifference, with all the associated Original artefacts moved off-site before inspection, they claim this sacred site exists in every conceivable manner, except that it was never officially registered in any White-fella document.

In what is as ironic as it is symptomatic, according to White-fella documentation there is no Githubal site between Casino and the border. That acknowledged site, once found near Casino, is registered and ticks all the boxes and has been completely destroyed.

The legal system has failed them yet again. Kevin Boota is adamant they are regarded as merely "numbers", while the police and politicians serve as middle management at the beck and call of miners and those who pull the purse strings. The Elders and custodians are aware as each day passes that the time will

begin digging. They have no choice but to act now.

There is an on-line petition listed through Avaaz, for any concerned global citizen, but more is needed in the meantime. An affidavit is all bar ready to be served, listing nine breaches in the final submission and will be served, but they hold little faith in the current legal system.

So deep is their frustration and suspicion with the present state of affairs, the Githubal have no choice but to look within and reinstate their heritage and lore. They no longer accept any jurisdiction bar their own. They are the custodians and final arbitrators of what takes place on their land. No longer do they acknowledge the laws and actions of those who come onto country blind to everything but profit and dividend.

The Githubal adhere to sovereign law. It is lacking in statutes, clauses and shelves of bound books – all they ask to receive and give is to "do no harm." But harm is being done to them. This sorry state of affairs must come to end, and to formalize the parting of the ways, the Githubal are in the process of compiling a small document/individual pledge thus providing an opportunity for non-Githubal supporters to commit to their struggle and pledge to stand by them.

The courts, police and parliaments serve a master they no longer accept. If serving in defense of land and culture, whether in protest against a quarry, mine or ČSG, such an individual stands above their law and beside Original law and lore. If charged while answering the call of culture and land, challenge their legitimacy and deny their authority and accede to sovereign law. If the machinery appears at Cedar Point, any 'unloreful' arrest that ensues will be denied and contested in the courts with

Green waste kerbside pick-up

Lismore City Council has announced it will begin free collection of green waste in rural villages from February 8.

Council workers are asking residents to please place all green waste on the kerb for pick-up while ensuring it does not block footpaths or impact traffic.

People should be aware that staff cannot go into private yards to collect waste - it must be on the kerb. Council staff suggest anyone who is unable to do this should ask neighbours or friends for assistance if they are unable to haul to the kerb.

"We have a lot to get through and we would really appreciate the help of residents during this time. Help a neighbour if you can and please respect that we can only collect green waste," Urban Works Engineer Dean Baldwin said.

"We have to make it very clear we are NOT picking up general waste. Furniture, carpets and other waste will not be collected and residents will need to dispose of these items themselves."

Rural village green waste collection will start from February 8. People should ensure they have their green waste placed on the kerb by this date as this will be a one-off collection.

Upcoming Nimbin roadworks

Roadworks on Nimbin Road adjacent to High Street (beginning near the 50 speed sign as you enter the village) are now likely to commence in early March due to the recent flood and sunsequent emergency works.

The planned roadworks include a 400m road reconstruction and widening with an upgrade of the existing drainage structure. The provision of a new footpath is also included in the scope of works from High Street to Cecil Street.

There will be traffic control in place and short time delays coming in and out of the village. Work is expected to take eight weeks, weather permitting. This project is jointly funded by the Regional Road Repair Program and Lismore City Council.

Police accountability

The article entitled "Police Force schizoid" by Warwick Fry (*NGT*, Jan 13, p17), raised some issues of fundamental importance to the safety and well-being of our communities. No arm of the government impacts upon individual lives more stridently than the police force and for this reason, police community relations should be of primary concern to all citizens.

In this day and age, it is naive and unrealistic to believe the police should not be accountable to anyone but themselves. In no other sphere of contemporary society would such an untenable arrangement be tolerated, (except perhaps for the banksters).

The community rightly demands and deserves transparency and accountability from government agencies and public institutions. Without the assurances guaranteed by the separation of powers, by independent oversight and regulation, the vestiges of social democracy and equal protection under the law will inevitably give way to the unfettered tyranny of a police state.

It doesn't take a litany of alleged abuses to aver the perception that police cause more harm than they prevent. It is an unfortunate fact that police are often tasked with duties which may require them to use force or in other ways do harm to citizens. It is perhaps understandable that some people consider the police to be a threat against which there is no defence.

In light of these challenges to harmonious police community relations, an effective system for investigating complaints against police would enhance the community's sense of security, help reduce fear of the police and thereby serve the interests of the police force as well as those of the community.

He then goes on to provide us with a textbook definition of 'capitalism'

Do we really want a society that is so unequal that many citizens will never be able to get over the artificial wall that has been imposed on them, and get ahead through no fault of their own, where government economic decrees based on the spurious claim of the national interest, when it is really for the benefit of the big end of town?

What is most disturbing of all, Mr Barlow goes on to claim the economy as we know it is not capitalism but 'Keynesian inflationism', 'interventionism" and 'corporatism' – all variant economic policy measures taken by governments trying to manage the capitalist system, especially in severe crisis. The 1929 Great Depression and the recent GFC are two notable examples where Keynesian economic policies were used by the state (governments) to spend their way out of crisis, with limited success.
