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Long Walk to Bush Theatre

Sadly, Mandela (1918-2013) passed away on the eve of this film's release, but this film stands as a testament to the man's courage and the strength of the relationships that helped him to rise to become such a beacon of love and peace for the world – a fitting antidote to 'September 11' hype,

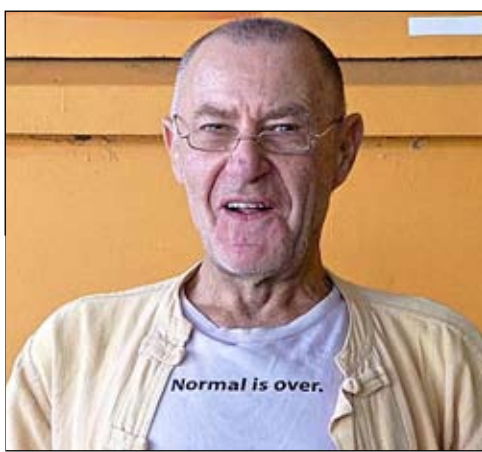
And now it's time for Spotlight, and this month the glare of publicity falls on Helmut Katterl (pictured), who produces *Tribal Planet* every Wednesday 11am-1pm.

OA: Helmut, welcome to *On Air*. Could you tell us why you got involved with Community Radio?

H: Thanks Bob. You know, I believe it stems from a desire to make other people feel good. It probably goes back to my childhood in Austria as the son of a refugee... just desperate to be loved.

OA: And you thought community radio was a gateway to love?

H: (laughing) Possibly. But seriously, I've been involved with music and sound production for many years. Back in Melbourne in the bad old days I had a recording studio called Richmond Recorders. It was a very alternative studio and we tried to mix it with the big boys. We had a lot of product go through, but because everything was leased, not a lot of profit stayed with the company. I realised pretty quickly that musicians don't have much money so I introduced the cut-price midnight to dawn sessions. \$250 plus



the wages of whatever engineer they use.

OA: So who recorded there?

H: Oh, just about everyone. Men at Work did a demo album there before going to the states, Nick Cave, The Models. This is late 70's, early 80's. Then, after going crazy down there I moved to Cairns for the next 25 years and got involved in Cairns Community Radio. And discovered that I really liked it. Later, when I came to Nimbin, you talked me into getting back into it.

OA: So why *Tribal Planet*?

H: Well, I've always been fascinated with Indigenous peoples and their tribal structures, particularly because tribal structures are, without a doubt, the most successful structures in terms of sustainability. These structures not only embrace sharing but they have an understanding of limitation; all things have limits which to my way of thinking needs to be applied to the whole planet, hence the theme of the show.

OA: How does this translate musically.

H: Oh, quite a bit of world music. But I like to explore issues. Last week we discussed prosperity without growth. Stuff like that. I also like to play music from "Trade Friendly" labels so to speak. Artists like John Butler and Jeff Tweedy who actively encourage people to freely share their music.

OA: Helmut, thanks for chatting.

H: It was good.

And briefly, a couple of musical recommendations with firstly, the latest offering from Blue King Brown. It's a great piece of work called *Born Free*. Recorded in both Melbourne and Jamaica, this CD is 100% revolutionary one-world reggae, definitely worth a listen. The other is from Nikki Bomba's outfit, Bustamento, entitled *Intercontinental Journal 7*, with a dozen tracks inspired by an equal number of countries that they've played in.

Our thanks go to the members of the club and especially to Andrew Barton for visiting the preschool to discuss the donation with us, and then organising this within the Nimbin Garden Club.

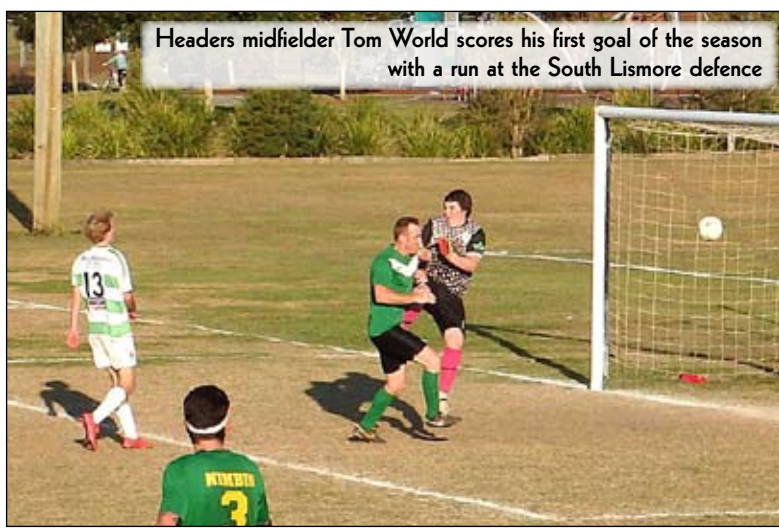
We would also like to thank Lorraine, Peter and Sue for coming to the preschool with Andrew to see what we have been doing, and to present their cheque to Alyse and Siena.

Men's 6th Division

Sat 8th August Headers v Thistles

About 16 minutes gone on the clock Headers' forward Tessa Rutley opens the scoring. Thistles on the attack, a shot is fired in, keeper saves.

Closing on the half hour mark, the Headers have a free kick about 10 meters inside there half. Laura Rutley takes it and floats the ball over the defence and her sister, Tessa who latches on to it and is away taking a couple of touches then glides the ball passed a stranded keeper into the left hand side of the net. Headers 2-0.

Thistles have a shot very close.

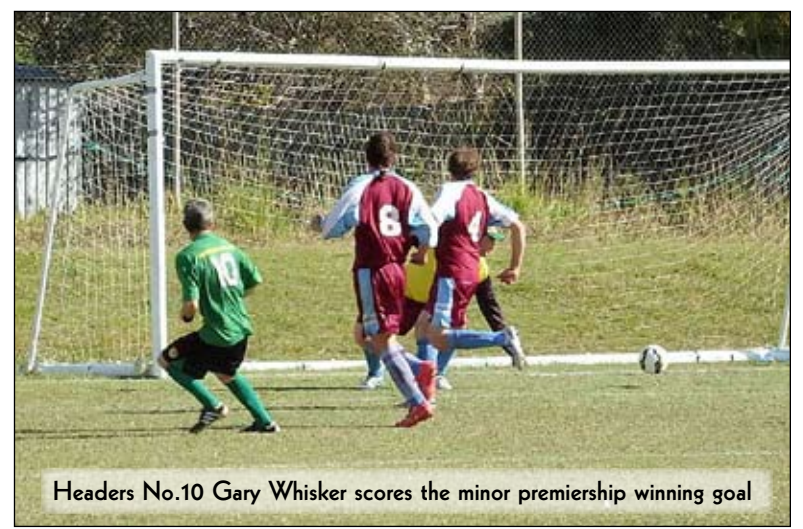
Taylor Moses capitalises from a bouncing ball in the Thistles box and stabs one past the keeper Headers 3-0 and that brings the first half to an end.

Headers have a corner. It's headed out by a Thistles defender. A nice cross by the Headers and a volley over the bar. Thistles are trying hard to reduce the deficit and are rewarded as a forward beats the off-side trap and with four defenders chasing her hits the ball passed the keeper Headers 3-1. With time running out, Thistles pile on the pressure but the Headers defence stand firm and see out the game and Thistles drop down a spot on the ladder.

Men's 6th Division

Sun 16th August Workers v Headers
The Workers were sitting in fourth spot but had lost the plot lately having a shock loss and a draw.

Headers were straight into their rhythm and on eight minutes left wing forward, Gary Whisker runs through and in between two defenders fires the ball past

South Lismore have a few more shots on target early in the second stanza, but Headers keeper, Uri Ross deals with them pretty comfortably.

With 20 minutes to go, the Headers change keepers with Craig Stieler replacing Uri Ross in goal.

Then Headers defender Tom World, (who has put in a man of the match performance defending, supplying the forwards and making the odd run through the middle to the attack) makes one of those runs

and puts the ball past the keeper before they collide. Headers 3-0.

Souths have a corner and the ball is hit towards the near post with the Headers keeper tipping it out. Nothing comes of the second corner.

With the shadows now getting longer by the minute, Beau Grabovsky gets his hat-trick with a ball he pushes across the keeper, with two defenders left in his wake and the keeper sprawled on the ground. Headers 4-0.

Phil Courtney gets in on the act with a run at a defender, accelerating, turning and firing home past a defender on the near post who drops his head to head the ball, but it's already hitting the back of the net. Headers 5-0.

With the final minutes being played out, the Headers keeper makes two more fine saves, and the score at full time is South Lismore 0 Nimbin Headers 5, and Headers hang on to their second spot two points clear of Burringbar and heading for a home semi-final against said team.
