Kindy at Tuntable

The advantages of a separate kindergarten class are numerous, and include factors such as similar ages and abilities and class unity as the children learn to identify with the larger school group, not to mention a gentle integration into the overall expectations of 'big school'.

The community philosophy of Tuntable Falls Community School means that active family involvement in the school setting is encouraged. Family involvement in schools is associated with academic success and when parents are able to share their children's home and community experiences, they come to view the school more positively.

This is highly valued in our school, where a Parent Committee runs the school in all matters of governance as well as having input into the learning curriculum - within the bounds of the NSW Curriculum.

The Kindergarten teacher, Deborah has put in place an effective learning program for the Kindies based on an understanding of children's needs and how they learn.

Having formal training as well as training in Steiner and Montessori education, Deborah feels that all children are catered for.

Taking elements of the different disciplines, she is able to develop a classroom environment suited to the different needs of each child, while at the same time, creating an environment of collaboration, joy and harmony.

A broad range of ages and developmental abilities are found in a new Kindergarten class, and it is important that children are happy and comfortable in their new environment.

For this reason, children are closely observed and gently encouraged in their new learning environment at Tuntable Falls Community School.

Children aching to read and write will soon discover opportunities to do so. However, those children still in the dreamy realm of early childhood will also find the environment rich, stimulating and satisfying.

All children have opportunities for exploration, investigation, self-directed work and learning through play while they are gently guided through the expectations of the curriculum.

Learning through play is an important part of the day, made all the more exciting by the beautiful forest setting out the back door of the classroom.

With the younger children in mind, the wonderful school vegetable garden was planned around children gardening and playing too.

As the garden features prominently in learning programs, teachers and parents feel it important that the children have play areas for downtime after the rigours of gardening. The sand pit amongst the vegetables is perfect for creative play.

The Kindergarten class and the pre-



school littlies love the responsibility of growing flowers and herbs in the garden.

The school also has the SEE Program (Sustainability and Environmental Education) where the learning curriculum is extended beyond the classroom, vegetable garden and into the rest of the school grounds and wider community.

The Kindergarten class partakes in aspects of the SEE Program by spending time outdoors on their sitting rocks, exploring the creek, going for walks and visiting each other's homes with our home visit program.

Self-select class for Nimbin Central

In 2018, Nimbin Central School will be Or better yet, a student could provide across all subjects.

Students may apply to join this selfselect class from Years 6 or 7 if they plan on attending school at NCS in 2018.

Students will be successful based on their ability to demonstrate how they have fulfilled the following selection criteria.

Positive Attitude

A positive attitude is mostly about maintaining and inspiring motivation in yourself and others. A student might provide an example of when they used a positive attitude to motivate themself to do extra work.

an example of when they maintained a positive attitude when everyone else was feeling down and their positivity won

Co-operation

Co-operation is about working with others to achieve a common goal.

A student could illustrate this by finding examples of when they listened to other members in their team and helped make their ideas a part of achieving the goal(s).

Grit

Grit is about 'never giving up', 'no quit', and putting up with things when they get hard and maybe even uncomfortable. Examples of this could be something like pushing through p in a Netball or Footy game.

A student could also find examples of when they pushed themselves beyond what they thought they could achieve in the classroom or at home.

All students who apply for inclusion in the class will be interviewed by a panel made up of the Principal, the Year advisor for that year and a parent representative from the P&C. These interviews will take place either late 2017 or very early 2018.

Although this class will follow the normal Stage 4 teaching programs across all subjects, the intention is that more student directed and collaborative learning opportunities will be offered.

Nimbin Central School staff also enjoyed the evening of fine food and company.


It was a pleasure to be a part of this important milestone event, formally marking the end of school life for this group of young people.

Sand, water and pipe play

For the past two terms the children of Tuntable Preschool have been experimenting with water and pipes and how water can be used as a source of energy.

Using the PVC pipes, split bamboo and trenches the children manipulated the flow of the water. They studied the effects of erosion by building walls to try and stop the flow. They measured how far objects would wash down a trench with different amounts of water flow.

Inspired by water as a source of energy some of the children designed a "water



machine station".

"It's made from pipes and sand and the water goes in here and goes up all the way up and then down into here," Leo explained. "It recharges the batteries of rockets with sun and wind and water and then they can blast off up up up into space."

The children took some of their ideas to the creek where they tried to stop the flow of the creek in a small area. They noticed that they slowed the flow but couldn't stop it completely.

"It's good to not stop the water because some of the animals might die, "Ruby said.

"And some of the trees might die too," Frankie added.



Moving to Ballarat - full story

am pleased to let everyone know that I will soon be moving to Ballarat – about 120 km from Melbourne. I have made a few quick and

dramatic changes in my life: 1) I left a good job Canada in 1973 and travelled through


- Asia for three years; 2) I arrived in Tennant Creek in 1975 and spent two years in
- the mining industry; 3) arrived at Tuntable and lived there for some 30+ years;
- 4) then moved to Nimbin suburbia for 13 years until
- 5) Ballarat here we come! I always planned to join a retirement village at some stage
- as I approach 69, it makes for an easier lifestyle in the company of people your own age. So we

can play our bingo and chat about all our ailments! Why Ballarat?

- 1) First let me stress that I do not have any life threatening illness or condition; however, when I do, I wish to be somewhere I can be assisted to die when life becomes too miserable for even a dog to live. Victoria is the only state where this will be possible (after you live there for a year). A newspaper article alerted to me of the good possibility that thousands of other older folk would move there with the same reasoning. The supply of retirement villages is tight at the best of times.
- 2) So I jumped on line within a day of the legislation being passed and found a search site which brought up a list of all vacancies in Victoria - there were a couple in Ballarat!
- 3) The more I looked at Ballarat, the better it looked. As most Aussies will know it was the centre of the gold rush and there was a lot of money splashed at it for several decades, eg beautiful historical buildings; wide roads with footpaths and easy parking everywhere and no traffic jams. It now has 100,000 people with a super-modern base hospital with heaps of specialists etc.

The gated village where I will stay has a bus stop at the gate with a bus every 15 minutes going to a bus and train terminal, with a train to Melbourne every two hours. Across the road there is a large TAFE campus with a community centre and 500 m down the road there is a Woolies, Aldi and a dozen Asian eating places are within 1 km.

The gated village has a dining room complete with chef, club room, laudromat etc. There are 43 units, each with a bedroom, bathroom, living room, kitchenette with bar fridge



and microwave oven, as well as a small private courtyard where one can have a garden, BBQ etc.

The menu is fairly basic but there is something different each day over a 28 day rotation and then it varies again depending on what is in season. Sunday is roast day: lamb, pork, beef, chicken etc. Friday is fish day; you get roast spuds one day, mashed the next, grilled, boiled, marinated, wedges...

And what do you pay for this one bedroom unit + food? Would you believe it is only \$404/week + about \$15 for power, for everything including three meals a day! You can opt in and out of any 1, 2 or all meals at any time. There is a normal bond for the rent part of \$1300 and a one-year lease.

I was told I could rent my house for \$350/week or sell for

\$350k. With interest at 2% I make half as much as renting so Nimbin Hills will look after the rental for me. Please see them if you are interested to rent my place.

What are the downsides? Well I will miss my Nimbin friends, my garden and the local colour and culture. And I have been warned about the bitter cold winters - but I should survive, coming from Canada.

I am looking forward to the new adventure!

Nimbin's Traditional Okinawan Gojuryu Karate-do students are all set to end 2017 with their final nerve-wracking, heart-stopping grading, preceded by an adventurous nature training in the nearby creeks and bush.

What a big year it has been for us all. Many have tried the traditional art of karate for the

first time. Students are loving the spiritual foundations, physical work-out, and the outlet to focus and stimulate their life force energies.

It has been described as a mind-body-spirit practice, with the gifts of life-long qualities inherent in every class: true respect and care for self and others, commitment to a purpose, humility, inner confidence, kinship, and self-mastery.

This young *dojo* only opened its doors in October last year, and we have grown to over 20 students, with all ages and genders from 11 to 50 years. As a female instructor with 30 years' experience, I am curious to find my karate classes attracting a large number of girls and women, yet as it is growing, the ratio of male to female students is finding its balance. It is rewarding to watch as students find their voice and power-centre through the 'kiai's and rigorous yet yielding training.

Our particular style is unique within

karate circles. Our Japanese name Go-ju aligns with the Chinese 'Yin-yang', meaning 'hard and soft', and so it is with our training. Weaving hard, strong, direct, quick self-defence techniques with the softer aspects of breath-work, circular, flowing, open-hand movements, we strike a balance that can work for almost anyone seeking a wholistic body practice.

We have 12 of our students grading this month, a nervous but exciting time where students build their ability to focus, develop their inner confidence, work on their self-discipline, and build qualities of perseverance and all-round strength.

Gasshuku, or nature training, takes us out bush this term, into the creek to learn from our natural surroundings. Every term sees a new outdoor venue, be it bush or beach, to test our awareness, balance, reflexes and selfdefence skills, using the environment in its diversity and unpredictability to train with. The ocean waves challenge us, the unknown creek-bed keeps us alert and responsive to change, and so on.

I am very excited to be able to share my life-long passion for the martial arts and the spiritual path it offers. I am delighted and humbled with the response to classes and the ongoing requests to teach younger students these important skills. Therefore I am offering more classes in 2018, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays during school terms:
