An expression of interest for a project government grant has been submitted, and also hours of research of The Northern Star archives undertaken. Collaboration with Southern Cross University continues. The project has been invited to participate with the 45th Aquarius Festival, and has attended its planning

There has been a small delay to the initial project community engagement and information tents at the Mullumbimby and Channon Markets, but these will hopefully be operating soon. The project is calling for more volunteers to assist at the market community engagement tents. Please assist with a little time. The tents mostly just need safety supervision, are selfexplanatory and project information sheets are also available for volunteers.

During March/April the project is calling out to Primary and Secondary school teachers and Principals for input to educational activities and programs to possibly take into schools for regional students to become more

aware to the legacies and historical events that lead to the creation of Nightcap National Park.

This is an important event in not only regional history but also national history, with a legacy that extends around the world. The project educational planning phase for schools and teachers and students is about to commence for school activities into 2019. After 40 years there are strong indications that unfortunately many students and even residents of the region now have little knowledge of the legacy and events of the Terania and Mt Nardi environmental protection actions and the creation of Nightcap National Park.

There is significant aboriginal connection to land and sacred places in these rainforest areas that is also little known to the wider public. The educational and information program and goals of the project are aiming to also help further expand this area of knowledge of regional history. Each week more and more regional organisations, institutions and members of the public are lending their support to the project and working collaboratively with the project.

Rainbow Cafe to rise again

Yes, folks, the Rainbow Cafe will rise: it is really, really about to rise out from all the paper plans, dreams, discussions, dramas and dialectics we have been engaging in for the past almost four years.

We are about to apply to Lismore Council for our construction certificate and then will be seeking tenders for the building of what is turning out to be a fairly modest structure, with good lighting and ventilation and a lovely new garden.

The small residence at the western end of the block will be screened from the café by the garden and the small shop fronting the main street will be much as it was in days gone by.

In the process of to and fro from the book of regulations (revelations), we have changed the internal layout of the café somewhat from the plans we put on exhibition for community feedback almost two years ago.

In order to accommodate access to the toilets on the northern wall of the building from the small shop attached



to the café, the kitchen and servery have been moved to our southern boundary (next to the old museum site).

Interior design and fit-out of the kitchen and café will remain the responsibility of the tenant, who will be chosen once the building is completed. There will be no major changes to the main structure of the building.

During the construction phase, the site will be fenced off and there will be

absolutely no access to it except for licenced builders and contractors carrying out the rebuild.

Once the building works are complete, we may seek community input for beautification of the garden and outside of the building.

We have been working very hard with our consultants, architects, and quantity surveyor to ensure our very limited budget will cover the work. Special thanks go to those employed who have put in extra effort to do this, especially Toni Appleton, Julie Lipsett, Alex Faulder and Karlin Bracegirdle – and to those of us on the committee who are still standing (Jonathon Spain, Ren Waterfall, myself and Tully Ward).



Rail trail funding frustrates train advocates

Page MP Kevin Hogan has announced federal funding of \$6.5 million for Stage 1 of the Northern Rivers Rail Trail. Mr Hogan said this project will, "revitalise small communities along the route, underpin the tourism industry as well as boost destination appeal encouraging visitors to stay longer and inject more money into our local economy".

This funding comes on top of an earlier announcement by the NSW Government of \$6.5 million funding contingent on matched funding from the Commonwealth.

But Beth Shelley, spokesperson for the Northern Rivers Railway Action Group, says the group is deeply disappointed in the news of federal funding for the Murwillumbah to Crabbes Creek Rail Trail/bike path and says the proposal is shortsighted.

It seems many people believe the NRRT group's statement that their rail trail proposal will protect the corridor. However David Oxenham, Tweed Shire Council director of engineering told *The Northern Star*, "Preliminary planning for the project would now commence... There's a number of steps we need to take and

the state needs to take including the changing of the legislation allowing the train tracks to be removed and the rail corridor closed as a train corridor."

In an SMH article in 2015, Jacob Saulwick reported that legislation was passed in parliament closing the heavy rail line in Newcastle and that Premier Mike Baird had confirmed that much of the land used for the rail corridor would be open for development.

"It has been stated very clearly in the Minister's speech to the parliament over the Tumbarumaba Rail Trail legislation that closing the railway line means the land would become crown land. As seen in Saulwick's article, it is possible that the State government could then decide to open the Casino to Murwillumbah railway for development," Beth Shelley said.

"State Rail owns a large section of Byron CBD and is already attempting to sell some of that land despite needing to take it to parliament first, so it's not hard to see that once the government gets the chance, they would happily sell the whole corridor."

Beth reckons the popularity of the Byron Bay train is proving how many people would like to use trains in this area. There has never been any public consultation on whether the local community wants to keep the Casino to Murwillumbah railway line for future trains in the region.

The Byron solar train's development director Jeremy Holmes told the *Northern Star* that train travellers had included plenty of visiting and local families, as well as locals aiming to beat the heavy traffic on Ewingsdale road and some workers travelling to and from work.

"The people of this community need to understand that it would be affordable, viable and save lives and if they want regular trains running from Casino to the Gold Coast they need to speak up. If the politicians who are meant to represent us in this area allow us to lose this important piece of transport infrastructure we believe they will regret it in the future," Beth said.

The rest of the world and even other regions in our own country are turning back to rail as the most viable solution to developmental planning, trade, social justice, economic sensibility and common sense. "We have to speak out about it now," Beth said.



Lismore at Southern Cross Uni on 21st March, 10am-4pm.


Power, decadence and the politics of distraction

Prom Brexit, to Trump and closer to home the awful reality TV show that our federal government has become, we are beset by a corrosive political and intellectual malaise.

We face a clear and present danger from climate change and other environmental risks but public and political debate has been sidetracked by the politics of decadence and distraction. For a society that owes much of its political, economic and social success to its historic embrace of secular rationalism (science), our collapse is being accelerated by our descent into distraction and delusion.

Belief in science has become optional for many. We will rely on it to engineer our car, but ignore it when it tells us our planet is in deep distress. Any problem that is too inconvenient to face up to, whether it is climate, refugees, rising inequality, or a long term shift in global power relations, is being ignored as we embrace populist politicians, conspiracy theories, fake news, or simply hide in our social media echo chambers where the algorithms simply confirm our existing beliefs.

The last month has seen our national politics sidetracked by the Barnaby Joyce affair. The affair itself distracted us from much bigger issues like the plight of the Murray Darling basin, closing the gap, and much

more, but a sexual affair was much more newsworthy. Even within the affair itself, there were real issues such as the misuse of public funds, conflicts of interest, rank political hypocrisy and power imbalances, but the best the federal government could come up with was a bonk ban. Classic politics of distraction. The sex wasn't the issue, so let's ban the sex.

We need to have laws in place to protect people from bullying, harassment and power abuse at work, but whenever as a society we have gone down the path of outlawing private consenting behaviours between adults it has been pretty much disastrous. I would include alcohol and drug prohibition, sex industry prohibition and the historic criminalisation of homosexual sex as three salutary lessons about the perils of such legislative forays.

The Nineteenth century philosopher John Stuart Mill gave us well-argued boundaries for state intrusion into our lives with his 'harm principle'. Basically the state is only justified in intruding into people's lives to stop them harming others, (assault, rape, harassment, bullying, etc) but not to enforce private morality. It is part of our current political and intellectual malaise however that principled arguments like these get lost in populism.

Laws that target private consensual behaviours have rarely if ever achieved their aim, but they have usually unleashed collateral consequences far more destructive than the 'problem' they targeted.


Once you prohibit private consensual behavior, how you will enforce it? Drug prohibition has delivered us a panopticon of surveillance, home, car and body searches, phone tapping, sting operations, helicopter raids and worse. I recall in the 1970s when homosexual sex was still a crime, police would set up sting operations at known beats, and sting operations also commonly targeted sex workers.

As a society we have seen the error of our ways, and removed the bonk bans against gay people, and decriminalised the sex industry. Sadly, we have not yet come to realise that drug decriminalisation could help end the vicious circle of organised crime, official corruption, imprisonment, deaths, overdoses and invasive policing that prohibition has unleashed.

The bonk ban is distractive politics at its worst. It actually skips the substantive issues that need addressing (power imbalance, conflicts of interest, harassment) whilst distracting attention to individual relationships. Worse still it would probably only worsen power imbalances, because in most cases, if the relationship were to continue, it would be the less powerful partner who would be leant upon to resign or move to another position.

It's not about the bonk ban though, it's about the bigger issue of where we are going as a society. Is politics all about a 24-hour news cycle, and knee-jerk responses to distract attention, or can we begin to refocus on the great challenges of our time, judge politicians for their ability to move the society forward in responding to those challenges, and discipline ourselves (particularly on social media) to engage in sensible, rational debate about issues.

We know what the big issues are: climate change, mining industry corruption, extinction, home affordability, poverty, inequality and many more. These are the issues we need to stay focused on, and we need to demand that our political leaders also focus upon them.

No, the world is actually not your oyster

2017 set another record with the highest temperatures globally but last year also set a record with international travel.

Over a billion foreign trips were taken by us in 2017 and it appears that to be thought of as cultured these days you have to be well travelled, but this is killing culture all over the planet!

The tourism industry is now the biggest employer in the world, employing 1 in 11 people but this growth in jobs comes at a cost.

This acceleration in international tourism has happened so rapidly that UNESCO and conservationists are calling for controlled numbers. Animosity is also growing in nearly all popular locations, with unwelcoming signs and tourist buses hi jacked regularly in Barcelona.

The reason for this resentment is, the cost of living has risen so much that most people cannot afford to live there. They are confronted by massive crowds, and most feel like they have lost or are losing their sense of community.

The beautiful city of Venice has always been an attraction for travellers but is now battling with tourist numbers that cannot be sustained. This floating city has a population of 55,000 but its visitors exceed over 28,000,000 ever year with huge cruise ships bringing thousands daily. Other ancient cities such as Timbuktu and Damascus are also experiencing a frenzy of travellers and have no authority to protect these ancient, historical sites.

The Maldives is another poor nation whose environment is being sacrificed to benefit tourists. There are over 87 exclusive resorts scattered across islands that were once uninhabited, supplying over 16,000 beds. I was shocked to learn that the Maldives burn 300

tons of rubbish daily on an island called Thilafushi, filling the sky with highly toxic fumes. Waste created from tourism is increasingly becoming problematic in all of these popular destinations especially the more isolated locations.

Angkor Wat is a prime example of the catastrophic results of tourism. This religious monument, that is the largest on the planet, has now become the number one World Heritage listed site to visit. UNESCO and conservationists are highly concerned that irreparable damage has already happened to the temples and relics as well as the environment. In 1993 a mere 7,650 people visited Angkor Wat but that figure had exploded to

3,000,000 in 2010.

What was once dense rainforest has now been replaced by a Las Vegas style shopping mall and a theme park. This is all within sight of Angkor Wat and in addition to that, two 18 hole golf courses. The resorts and water-hungry golf courses are pumping directly from the water that Angkor Wat sits on, causing the temples to slowly sink, as well as untreated sewerage from these resorts goes directly into the Siem Reap River.

Every evening three thousand tourists make their way up the ancient staircase of Phnom Bakheng temple, just to get a clear view of sunset over Angkor Wat.

On the other side of the globe, the once tranquil Machu Picchu, that sits in one of the most spectacular locations on earth is now accessible to everyone, transforming this isolated archaeological site into a noisy and crowded place. Over 5,000 travellers visit daily and because of this, the Inca Trail, that has survived for well over a thousand years, is slowly being eroded away. I question whether many of the people who visit these ancient sites have any real understanding and appreciation of their historical significance.

Most of us would remember the movie Beach? It was filmed on Phi Phi island, a spot that was virtually unknown. Since the release of this movie, this once heavenly island has totally been destroyed. Luxurious yachts and boats fill the entire area and the beach is overcrowded with people. The majority of small craft are operated by poor Thai locals, in unseaworthy vessels that are causing oil and petrol spills. The smell of the ocean breeze has been replaced by the smell of petrol and the beach itself is littered with garbage. Conservationists are highly alarmed at the level of environmental damage that is occurring, with no authority to protect this paradise.

In Italy, five tiny villages in Cinque Terre are representative of this growing bitterness towards tourists. These villages are situated between Genoa and Pisa and were hidden from the world until an English newspaper discovered them. That was fifteen years ago and the residents are now calling for a reduction in visitors. Their relaxed lifestyle has become mayhem with tourists disembarking from huge cruise ships several times a week and the approaching roads are congested with coaches.

Closer to home is Bali and I know most Australians have visited this little island on more than one occasion so you cannot claim ignorance on the transformation that has taken place. This tropical paradise has unquestionably been destroyed and replaced with shopping malls and hotel chains. Denpasar is now crammed with traffic and pollution fills the air.

This is just a small sample, and these unique destinations have totally lost their charm and do not resemble what made them attractive in the first place. The finger can only be pointed at you, the tourist, because you are responsible for this dangerous trend that's taking place.

All I can conclude is the average tourist's main concern is their own experience regardless of the devastation being caused. The world is not yours or anyone's oyster and if this persists all that will remain is snapshots and memories of these once truly amazing sites.

'Reckless' restructure of National Parks imminent

Our national parks receive more than 40 million visits in New South Wales each year, and an overwhelming 94 per cent of visitors describe themselves as satisfied or very satisfied with their experience.

Parks like Nightcap National Park and Mebbin National Park are an important part of the community, environment and public space.

Since 1967, the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has looked after our National Parks and wildlife, worked for the conservation of native and threatened species, educated generations of school children and played host to countless camping holidays and bushwalks.

Greens NSW environment spokesperson Dr Mehreen Faruqi MLC (pictured) says that their ability to perform these essential public services is now under serious threat from a series of cuts and job losses proposed by the NSW Liberal/ National Government.

"Whistleblowers have come forward with stories of hidden budget cuts,



while staff have been blindsided by restructures that see experienced experts pushed out the door.

'The government's claim to have added jobs at the NPWS is a smokescreen: demotions, redundancies and resignations have seen the departure of skilled career staff. New hires are made at a lower pay level, with fewer skill requirements," Dr

Faruqi said in a statement.

Hundreds of staff are reportedly being affected, including those responsible for invasive species and fire

The erosion of NPWS staff numbers and expertise may explain the glacial pace of new national park declarations.

"Clearly the government sees NPWS rangers, firefighters, ecologists and pest control officers as liabilities, not as the assets they are," Dr Faruqi said.

"They don't see them as protectors of nature with conservation at the heart of their responsibilities - and perhaps that is the reason the government wants to get rid of them," she said.

The Greens claim that if the NPWS restructure goes ahead, the NSW community will soon notice the consequences: fewer rangers, closed tracks, less maintenance of visitor facilities and encroaching invasive species will become the unfortunate

"There will be a knock-on effect on local jobs, tourism and the local economy," Dr Faruqi said.

Last month, on 2nd February, a Regional Forest Agreement (RFA) stakeholder meeting was held in Lismore, with the EPA, DPI and concerned members of environment protection groups and the

NEC was well-represented, and Nat from NNIC represented WIRES.

Submissions had been required, though the general feeling was that this process was only paying lip service to the consultation process.

The EPA was ineffectual, even when there had been breaches, and they had met with the timber industry representatives separately.

A Save Koalas protest on 2nd February was wellattended, with around 100 people. Friends of the Koala and Greens were represented, proceeding to the meeting venue and assembling outside the room, with some representatives going inside.

A Strategy to Save the Forests workshop has been organised by Ruth Rozenhek on Sunday 4th March from 1-4pm at Lismore Workers' Club, to write submissions regarding the RFA.

Update on Limpinwood: The temporary voluntary halt on logging is over: logging will most likely resume in March, prompting probable blockading. This is private logging, and the ideal outcome would be if



the owner's forestry license was withdrawn. Regulations are being flouted, koala trees cut down, and the EPA is not being effective. Tweed Council is investigating what they can do.

In the meantime, in preparation, a Non-Violent Direct Action (NVDA) skills-share workshop will be co-ordinated by Alan Roberts and Ruth from 10am-3pm on Saturday 10th March near the rotunda in the park opposite the Sunnyside Shopping Centre in Murwillumbah. The session is free and information can be gained on the NRG website or FB

NEC hosted the premiere of the documentary #StopAdani: A Mighty Force! in February. For copies of this informative film, visit the NEC shop.

A rally to protest the loss of trains on the Casino to Murwillumbah line has been organised by NRRAG on Thursday 15th March at 3pm in Murwillumbah. Meet at the old Murwillumbah railway station, to march to Council offices.

Some people plan to convert the train track to a bike trail. It is a major concern, and train activists



are determined not to lose the transport corridor.

A pipeline from the Pillliga to Sydney is being constructed. Farmers are disgusted. There is information on the websites of the Great Artesian Basin Protection Group and Pilliga Environment Group. David Paull, an ecologist, is testing soils and conducting ecological surveys.

Front Line Action Camp (FLAC): Alan recently travelled north, and reported that FLAC have purchased a 40 hectare property for a headquarters. The farm house is used for the office. The setup there includes vegie gardens and workshop space. There have been activities and demonstrations undertaken at Airlie Beach Market to further this campaign.

If you are interested in becoming active in the Stop Adani movement locally, the Stop Adani Lismore group holds its meeting every second Tuesday at 6pm at the Butterfly Room, on the corner of Hindmarsh and Orion Streets. They can be contacted on:

Come along, meet the friendly folks and see what part you could play in protecting our precious environment.




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7 Sibley Street update



In Bonalbo the new Multi-Purpose Service (MPS) is alive and progressing well. Cheryl Ducat, Nurse Manager (NM), advises that staff have been given an orientation to the layout of Stage 1 of the building and education on the new systems. They are now looking forward to the handover of the keys.

The Stage 1 construction comprises 15 residential aged care beds, a 24-hour emergency department, inpatient beds and outpatient consultation rooms. When the MPS opens next month, only the existing services currently provided at the Bonalbo Hospital, namely the emergency department, doctor and community/allied health services, will be transferred across to the new MPS.

Stage two will commence once the existing hospital services are transferred across to the new MPS, and will comprise the kitchen and laundry facilities required to operationally open the residential aged care facility and the acute care beds. It also comprises staff facilities, the mortuary, ambulance bay and staff accommodation.

At this time there is no happier group in the region than the members of the Bonalbo Hospital Auxiliary. This loyal band of fundraisers have for years now continued their monthly meetings at 2pm on the second Tuesday of the month at the Bonalbo Scout Hall. They are looking forward to eventually holding their meetings in a room at the new MPS.

Merrill Carr, secretary of Bonalbo Auxiliary and member for twenty years, has represented her organisation at the new MPS planning meetings and regularly reports back to members. They are then able to pass on correct information about the progress of the building to friends, relatives and neighbours.

The closing of the hospital actually generated new Auxiliary members. The Bonalbo community never gave up hope and after a new doctor was recruited by North Coast Health to open up a GP clinic operating out of the hospital, funding was received from the government to establish an MPS to service over 5000 people in the area.

The Auxiliary have raised funds with regular raffles, bingo, street stalls, book fairs. They have established a considerable term deposit ready to be spent on equipment and necessities for the new facility. Cheryl Ducat, NM, who regularly attends the Auxiliary meetings, confirms that patients' comfort and care has really been helped by the purchase of important equipment over many years and simple acts of kindness like providing toiletry bags for those people who arrive at hospital without their own. Over Christmas and on Boxing Day, the Auxiliary delivered a basket of fruit for nurses who were working on the public holidays.

A regular presence is important for fundraisers, and on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month, the Auxiliary run the bingo at the Bowling Club at 7pm. Street stalls are held on Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day featuring homebaked goods, chutneys, relishes and a raffle. The Spring Book Fair on a Saturday in October 2017 was for all ages and held at Old Bonalbo Soldiers' Memorial Hall. Plants and seedings and handicrafts were available alongside the books. There was even a pop-up Auxiliary cafe with sandwiches, slices, cakes, coffee and tea.

Recently the Mountain Blue Blueberry Farm responded to a letter and agreed to provide crates of blueberries for fundraising for the MPS, so now the street stalls are featuring blueberry crumble, blueberry cakes, blueberry jam, relish and chutneys.

The patron of the United Hospital Auxiliaries (UHA) NSW is Linda Hurley, wife of the NSW Governor. She has written a song for UHA branches, and at the December meeting Dianne Carr, treasurer, "bluetoothed" the words and music to her laptop and those there sang it wholeheartedly.

At the beginning of each meeting the members recite 'Let us Hold High the Lamp of Service for the Welfare of our Hospitals'. The Bonalbo Auxiliary certainly embodies this UHA Motto.

Today is a good day to die*

The Mourning News by Megan James

he moment when my mate died, passed over, gave up the ghost, were a revelation to me, as no doubt to anyone who has been present at a death

The slow, inevitable dissolution of all the intricate life-support systems within his body was profound, heavy and deep to witness. But not frightening, though it made me sad.

The hours before death were like a sombre requiem while the breathing eventually slowed like a final passage of music. The release of spirit energy was as sweet as any birth.

Being very present and close with someone dying made me so very aware of many things, not least of which were the similarities between the physical processes of birth and of death. Soft lighting, gentle music and sensitive care are needed in both birth and death.

Inhibitions about bodily functions become totally irrelevant. The patient waiting, the sense of timelessness at the moment of birth or death.

For my friend, dying in the last stages required a labour no less intense than birth and, I feel, just as rewarding in the final outcome, though I may never fully know just how that will be until my own time comes.

Other similarities came to mind also. When I was a young woman in Asia, I was walking home along a jungle road at night alone and a young man followed me, attacking me and asking 'Do you want to die?' This was later explained to me by locals as meaning 'do you want to have sex?' (Fortunately a rare vehicle came by which frightened my attacker away).

I do suspect that the transformative and uniting quality of sex and orgasm equates to that of death and dying also. So we are bound at all moments of our life to this life force that especially shows us its massive transforming power at the moments of procreation, of birth and of death.

The fragile self that our family, society and our own desires have so painstakingly built up and nurtured over a lifetime, is then subject to this massive force of nature of God – of transformation. And the body we have likewise nurtured returns to dust, with the ego held within it.

Possibly the only thing we can be sure of is that we only get one chance at life on earth in the physical body we now

possess – and that body will most probably wear out and certainly ultimately decay.

Our consumer culture relies on us to swallow the lie that happiness is only possible for the young and beautiful, perpetuating the myth of endless growth that powers capitalism. This same culture is so eager to encourage us to pursue the demands of ego for success, gratification and all the other temporal pleasures and pains — and to avoid mentioning or being present with death.

And yet, paradoxically, we in the West are blessed, by the advances in medicine of the very same culture, with the opportunity to grow old.

Through this we have been given a choice to gain in wisdom, experience and understanding of real spiritual values. The extension of our lives by medical means both foul and fair, is available – which sadly also many times decreases our quality of life while it increases our fear of death.

But there is truly nothing to fear. Spirit is strong, uniting us and all the creatures of this beautiful world, in birth and in death and all moments in between and beyond.

Coral not coal

I recently received an email from Federal Labor Deputy Opposition Leader Tanya Plibersek in response to my concerns about Labor's support for the Adani coal mine. Here are some extracts:

"Climate change and environmental protection are among the most important challenges facing this country. I do not believe that the (Adani) Carmichael mine project stacks up economically or environmentally. Businesses are even refusing to finance the project...."

"The Great Barrier Reef is Australia's greatest natural resource and requires the strongest possible environmental protection. It is already under great stress. We must do everything we can to ensure that it is preserved for generations to come. Not only is it an environmental asset, it also supports tens of thousands of jobs for Australians....

"Labor is committed to zero net pollution by 2050, in line with the Paris Agreement. We believe that Australia can be a leading clean energy superpower....

"Renewables are Australia's future. We need a clean energy policy that gives us certainty and encourages further investment in renewables.... Having a plan for renewables is not only good for our environment; it is good for our economy, too.... Renewables are becoming cheaper than coal. They create decent, sustainable jobs."

Research undertaken by the Australia Institute reveals that only 1,494 jobs will be created by the Adani coal mine, not 10,000 as falsely claimed by Adani and the Queensland Labor Government. However, 69,000+ tourism-related jobs are at stake if the Great Barrier Reef is not protected.

Even though Queensland

Labor has honoured its election promise to veto a taxpayer-funded loan for Adani to build a 388km rail line from the mine to the shipping port, they support the biggest coal mine in Australia's history being built in the Galilee Basin, ignoring the impact it will have on the Great Artesian Basin and the Great Barrier Reef. And Federal Labor has not publicly stated their opposition to the

Arms exports obscene write regarding the Liberal/National

Coalition government's recently unveiled 'Defence Export Strategy' (January 29, 2018) with its ten-year ambition to make Australia one of the top ten arms manufacturers and exporters in

This newly declared policy initiative can only make Australia and our region less safe, and will inevitably cause untold human misery, suffering, morbidity and death. Such a policy initiative demonstrates a profound spiritual malaise and disconnect, and exemplifies a reckless disregard for the basic values of peace and justice.

Australia is already one of the top twenty arms exporters in the world. Defence Industry Minister Christopher Pyne said Australia would focus on growing sales to its biggest markets, including the United States, Britain, Canada and New Zealand, along with the 'Middle East', South Korea, Japan and others.

These states, identified by the government as priority recipients of Australian military hardware, have been chosen for what is considered to be their strong human rights records and support for the rules-based international order.

If the government's criteria for what constitutes a strong human rights record is applied, then I suppose anyone with the money to pay will be a recipient of

Australian arms sales.

In March 2017, Australian companies signed military contracts to provide weapons to the House of Saud, amid that regime's ongoing brutal and unjust military intervention in neighbouring Yemen.

Yet Australian law prohibits military exports that are inconsistent with Australia's international obligations or national interests.

As a starting point, the government should immediately ban all Australian arms sales to the Saudi Arabian regime.

What do you care if you are getting big dollars to host a tower on your land? Well, we all know someone who is EMF sensitive, in fact

themselves living in the hills have done so to escape the bombardments of city life. Yet the electromagnetic city soup is hot on our heels. The question is - are you insured if your neighbours become sick because of your tower? The answer to that is NO, although Telstra will lie to your face to get the lease of your land.

Lloyds of London is the 'go to' insurer if you're seeking insurance against almost anything, apart from the deleterious effects of EMF on health, since 2015. If Telstra can't get insurance, you can be sure that you won't either, and if you have already signed up I would check the small print on your contract.

EMF sickness is a recognised health condition with biological markers, so you can be sure that your neighbours will visit their 'Specialist' for some beforeand-after tests to make suing you that much easier, in fact a support group is currently being created to assist people with EMF sensitivity and in fact healthy folks, to do just that. This has been one of the biggest factors for property owners in considering whether to sign a deal with NBN or Telstra. This has especially been true for families with young children, who are suspected to be more vulnerable to the effects of the electromagnetic emissions.

There will always be the 'one' who is won over by the dollar sign despite all of their neighbours altruistically refusing Telstra. Although vou can be fairly certain that the altruistic neighbours probably won't be so altruistic when it comes to your party invites, and all the ways that you once enjoyed their company.

It's a lonely life being a Telstra tower land leaser, so you might just find yourself spending more time in your EMF-ridden home wondering where those aches and pains and lumps and bumps are coming from, but you will have enough money for 'groceries' though, so can't be all that bad, right?

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
