This village is still recovering from the 2015 earthquake.

Terry would have loved to come to the village to help, eagerly requesting updates from the start of our project.

Unfortunately, ill-health prevented him coming over, so we would love to build another house as a memorial to this generous man, adding



to the 11 already completed and occupied.

One man in the village, a subsistant farmer named Mirke, lost his wife and baby son in the earthquake. He has three other daughters.

Before the earthquake he borrowed money from his extended family in another region to build a house for his growing family. This house was flattened.

He did receive the Government subsidy, the first instalment of \$500, but because the road was not open due to landslides for 18 months, rebuilding could not start.

With the subsidy, families are expected to start rebuilding within a



timeframe, using Government modules, regardless of road conditions, literacy and the financial status of the affected villages.

This man repaid his family instead, and now he and his daughters are living in a tin humpy and expected to repay the Government. I would love to build this family a house.

In 1919 Rudolf Steiner was asked to develop a school for the workers in the Astoria factory of Emil Molte, and the Foundation Stone was laid in that year; the first Waldorf/ Steiner School was opened in Germany in Stuttgart.

This year we are celebrating 100 years of Waldorf/Steiner Education all over the world. As part of this, students from all Steiner Schools wrote and received cards to and from other Steiner Schools around the globe. We displayed them at school, sorted them by countries and put up a World map at the School entrance, so the students could find the countries. How does this Education contribute to the changing world we are living in today?

As I just met with exstudents of my last class, that I taught from year 1 to year 6, and who are now in year 11/12, I will give you examples of their answers to the following question: "What do you think the Primary Steiner School experience has given you?"

Something outstanding is the supportive environment they experienced through the building relationship of their class teacher and support teachers over that period. The relationship can be described as loving authority. They valued that they called their teachers by their first name and that the teacher was guiding them with respect and open communication, and they were accepted as who they are. They believe that this helped them with good relationship building, having acquired people skills.

They value the creativity they gained and mentioned how he story-telling and retelling has given them listening skills,

as well as a well-developed memory. The many stories and lessons on Cultural History gave them varied cultural insights and experiences.

They are confident and think that they are wholesome young people because of the many other skills they learned, which the continuous craft lessons were an important part of.

But what about the academic skills? Here we had different experiences. Several students said that they were ahead in English and maths which helped them with the transition, and they are still excelling, while others struggled because of their difficulties in these areas, which were mostly related to dyslexia.

While they felt supported in the Steiner system, I would say that some students experienced hardship and didn't get the recognition and support they needed until later (Nimbin Central School being mentioned positively).

They still feel a strong bond, even though they are at different schools, some having moved away. They believe that the students coming from the Steiner School have a good reputation. And of course, the many excursions and class camps will stay in their memory forever.

I was amazed how well they had reflected on their experiences. And interestingly, now they understand the values behind the curriculum which they not always embraced wholeheartedly at

Imagine how much more can happen in their development if they could attend a Steiner High School in the area! We are offering Middle School, year 7/8, which allows more growth and maturity before making the change.

And the vision of a Hi School lives on.

Tuntable Falls community school believes in an educational approach where the children learn that the environment is inseparable from themselves: they are the environment and the environment is them.

Our objective is to 'grow green' children, equipped with the tools, knowledge and the passion to pursue a sustainable future.

To walk to talk of Sustainable and Environmental Education (SEE) we at Tuntable Falls Community School follow three simple steps to grow 'green children.'

Firstly, we 'engage' with the environment. The children are involved in the holistic process of growing their own food.

From the tiny seed, the children learn to organically farm an enormous range of seasonal vegetables in our abundant school garden.

They harvest the food in preparation for seasonal communal meals as well as producing jams and sauerkraut.

We are planning an orchard and also building bird boxes throughout our school to encourage birds to safely nest in our school grounds.

We have chickens that we care for each day, and recently learnt how to build a biodynamic compost heap with Phil Dudman.

The second objective that we consider to be an essential ingredient in the SEE program is 'exposure' to local communities. We achieve this by tailoring frequent camps and excursions.

By exploring the wider community, the children are given opportunities to interact with the assets of our community, the natural environment, its inhabitants and their outstanding initiatives.

We live in such a culturally rich region and it's very beneficial for the children to discover these community projects to fully experience history in the making.

The third ingredient is our ability to 'link' the environment and local community to the

Although we adhere to the NSW primary curriculum, we program it in a way that tailors for our children's unique interests and the school's deep environmental ethos.

When we as teachers do this effectively, it enables the children to link their real-life experiences to the expected academic outcomes in an authentic learning program.
