Wayfinding Project

Council has been receiving lots of calls asking for an update on the Nimbin Wayfinding Project, so here you go.

Pedestrian Link: The new footpath from Cullen Street to the Western Carpark has recently been completed in a way to mitigate the site restrictions and gradient. The inclusion of two new stairs along the footpath were required to ensure the gradient was compliant with Australian Standards for Footpaths.

The second stage to this project, currently underway, will see the inclusion of high visibility paint along the step treads and solar light bollards installed to enhance and increase visibility both day and night.

Feedback from the community highlighted the need for enhanced signage and improved accessibility access from the Western Carpark to the village, currently located at the Northern end of the carpark.

Improved signage is being pursued as a priority project for Lismore City Council in

includes the establishment of a new parklet next to the Green Bank on Cullen Street. This parklet is being constructed along the roadside verge, and does not impact car parking numbers.

The parklet is currently under construction and is scheduled for completion by the end of March.

Prior to the completion

of the overall project, both sites will see the introduction of plantings, drainage management and a thorough site clean-up.

Council will be conducting post-delivery feedback in April 2024 to obtain feedback regarding the project including addressing any concerns the community may have.

Time for a closer look at supermarket pricing

It is clearly time for an investigation into what's happening with supermarket prices, and I welcome the Prime Minister's announcement of an ACCC inquiry into retail pricing and allegations of price gouging.

We have all seen the price of the weekly grocery shop going up at the same time as the big supermarket chains are reporting massive profits. (In the 2023 financial year, Woolworths reported a total net profit after tax of \$1.72 billion, and Coles profit was \$1.1 billion.)

I've had a lot of local farmers ask me what's going on. They want to know why the prices they are getting for produce have dropped so much, but supermarket prices haven't come down.

While supermarket pricing and competition is a Federal Government matter, I am raising it here because it affects all of us.



The Federal Government had already announced an inquiry into the effectiveness of the Food and Grocery Code of Conduct which is a voluntary code supposed to improve how supermarkets deal with suppliers.

But the latest announcement of a pricing inquiry by consumer watchdog, the ACCC, is the most powerful action yet. This is something that farmers wanted to see because it can force supermarkets to reveal their farmgate prices and contracts.

The inquiry will include an investigation into the competitiveness of small and independent retailers, including regional and remote areas.

To help shoppers be better informed, the Government is funding consumer group Choice to

provide quarterly reports on price transparency and the comparative costs of grocery goods at different retailers

I welcome this ACCC price inquiry because, as the Treasurer says – we want a fair go for families and for farmers.

Save on power bills

If you have suffered power bill shock lately, there are a few things you can do that could bring your bill down.

Electricity retailers are not allowed to charge exit fees or early termination fees when you decide to switch your supplier. You are free to find a better energy deal at any time.

And there is a quick online method for finding out the best deal. The Australian Energy Regulator has a website: energymadeeasy.gov.au where you pop in your suburb, and provide the code from your latest power bill, and it calculates the best deal based on your usage.

One of my staff did the calculation and found she could save \$400 a year by switching to another provider, so it's worth investigating.

Also remember to check for any rebates you may be eligible for – there are a range of NSW Government energy rebates for low-income households, families, independent retirees and others.

Great to see this \$14.9 million project open back in December. This road had two significant landslips in the immediate aftermath of the flood.


This project required 239 piles to provide support, before building a 4.5-metre-high retaining wall. A lot of work done on this very important road. I thank everyone involved.

It's time to control killer cats

Responsibility for, and control over, domestic cats in Australia and NSW has been a running issue for jurisdictions and communities for decades.

While politicians have ignored the crisis of roaming cats, and the billions of native animals that are killed by them every year, we have moved further and deeper into the extinction crisis. It is actually unbelievable that other than being required to be microchipped cats and their owners are not regulated in NSW at all.

Every year that goes by without Governments acting to ensure domestic cats are controlled is another disastrous year for native wildlife. The data is shocking. Pet cats alone are responsible for 390 million animals being killed in Australia every year, just in Sydney 66 million native animals are killed by domestic pet cats annually. Feral cats are an even more colossal killer, with 2 billion

native vertebrates and 1 billion invertebrate animals killed in Australia every year.

Cats are a huge problem, no argument, but irresponsible pet ownership has been an ignored crisis for too long and it's time to correct this historical and ongoing mistake. The Greens want to see new responsibilities introduced for all cat owners to ensure that cats cannot roam outside the property where they are kept.

We expect that dog owners, graziers and other animal owners are responsible for where their animals are – but cat owners have, until now, just shrugged their shoulders and argued that you can't control cats. This is nonsense and we will no longer accept it.

The simple fact is, that if a

person cannot control their cat, and ensure that it is inside and not a risk to other animals, then they should not have a cat. Of course, there needs to be education and support provided to people in vulnerable circumstances, but we cannot allow cats to continue to massacre native animals in their billions, we just need to tackle the problem.

This is why I have now given notice of a Bill that will give council rangers the power to pick up cats that aren't on the property where they should be. If a person allows a cat to leave their property uncontrolled or does not take action as necessary to prevent a cat from leaving their property, then that person should be held to account. There are



so many Councils that want to do the right thing so we are working to give Councils the power to ensure that the most sensitive environments in their local government areas have the greatest protection from cats that is possible.

Keeping cats inside is the safest and most humane option for cats as well as native animals and the broader ecology of NSW. We

desperately need to act and that's what we are doing. The Greens are here to do what is right and what evidence dictates, not what is easy.

I hope you will stay tuned and support our campaign to get cat containment laws for NSW.

Spare no expense to stamp out fire ants – vigilance needed

Tamara Smith MP is calling on the Minister for Agriculture Tara Moriarty to take further action to eradicate imported red fire ants in the Northern Rivers Region.

Ms Smith said, "We must take urgent action to stamp out fire ants and prevent a potential environmental catastrophe."

Fire ants were discovered in January by a local farmer in Wardell, just months after they were sighted further north in South Murwillumbah in late November.

"These ants can kill wildlife, kill pets, and devastate our local agriculture industry," Ms Smith said. "We should spare no expense in stamping these ants out, or else we're looking at much more expensive implications for the community down the road."

Ms Smith is particularly concerned that construction materials, imported at increasing rates following the 2022 floods, have enabled more ways for fire ants to be quickly transported across long distances.



"It's important that the NSW government inspects every post-flood inspection site to make sure fire ants have not spread further," she said.

"I'm confident Minister Moriarty will treat this issue with the urgency it deserves, and I look forward to working with the government on this issue."

Emergency response

The next part of the emergency response in South Murwillumbah is to treat and look for fire ants within the 500m to 5km section of the designated Movement Control Area.

It is vital that fire ant teams can check and treat 100% of properties in the 5km zone, whether fire ants are visible or not, to protect residents and businesses from the harmful impacts of this invasive pest.

The National Fire Ant Eradication Program requires the consent of landowners to access their properties. Treatment can only be applied with the written consent of the property owner.

Mayor of Tweed Shire, Chris Cherry urged landowners and tenants to support fire ant treatment activities and provide teams with consent to access their properties by signing the consent form as soon as possible by filling in the form on"Just one missed nest could put our entire community and way of life at risk," Cr Cherry said.

The treatment for fire ants is made up of small pieces of corn grit soaked in soybean oil. It contains a low concentration of insect growth regulator.

The chemical used is not a poison and is safe around people, animals and in the environment.

Reece Pianta, Advocacy Manager for the Invasive Species Council said, "Everyone in the Northern Rivers should be out checking for fire ants, particularly if you have had any recent material delivered to your property like soil, turf or mulch.

"The new infestation at Wardell should also trigger an urgent review of the adequacy of fire ant eradication funding by the Albanese Government," she said.

At present the planned funding is only half the amount recommended by a comprehensive study.





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John Pilger: Maverick journalist (1939-2023)

In a 2011 speech defending Julian Assange, John Pilger recalled how it was always impressed upon him when he was young that Australia was a brave country: that we stood up to authority, and we stood up for justice.

Such national myths were at best half-truths, Pilger said, but in our political life, there was scant evidence of this. But now and then, an Australian came along who made such myths seem true. Julian Assange was such an Australian, John Pilger said.

"I find him an extraordinarily brave Australian. And I can't say that about many of my compatriots in the same way. I'm not saying that there aren't brave Australians, but I can't think of any that has really been so unusually brave by his standing up to a superpower. Brave in starting a project like WikiLeaks that he knew would get him into trouble.

"One of the things that of course almost has never come out of the generally appalling media coverage of Julian and WikiLeaks is the reason for WikiLeaks. It had a moral base. It was about justice. He nailed his colours and the colours of WikiLeaks to that mast. This was going to be about justice.

"It was about seeking justice through letting people know what is going on, to letting people know what those who have power over their lives are saying. I can't tell you how brave this is. Many people have tried to do this and failed. Julian succeeded actually, because the information that he has got out to people all over the world and has made a difference."

Those same moral qualities that Pilger admired in Julian Assange underpinned Pilger's own journalism. Like many Australians, I have read numerous Pilger articles, a few of his books, and watched several of his more than 60 documentaries. I stand in awe of his enormous output over six decades of what he called "maverick" journalism.

Most of his documentaries and scores of his articles are available on his website: *johnpilger.com* which is an enormous journalistic treasure trove, a contrarian archive of the history of our times.

The breadth of Pilger's journalism was staggering. Over five decades he covered wars and social conflicts in Vietnam, Cambodia, Nicaragua, Iraq, Burma, China, Okinawa, the Chagos Islands, Timor Leste, Chile, South Africa, Australia (frequently), Mexico, Japan, Czechoslovakia, the UK, the US etc, etc. He produced powerful documentaries about these issues. He was truly a globespanning journalist.

His first documentary, *The Quiet Mutiny* (1970), was about US soldiers in Vietnam who were 'fragging' their officers, which was slang for throwing grenades into the tents of the commanding officers they didn't like. Many of the conscripted US soldiers were rebelling against the Vietnam war.

His most impactful documentaries were Year Zero: The quiet death of Cambodia (1979) about the Khmer Rouge, and Death of a Nation: The Timor Conspiracy (1994). His final documentaries were The Coming War with China (2016) and The Dirty War on the NHS (2019).

It is worthwhile visiting his website, not only for these documentaries, but for a series of interviews he did of other journalists, called *Outsiders*. Pilger interviewed two other great war journalists from the generation before him who covered the Second World

War: Wilfred Burchett, who talked about being the first Western reporter into Hiroshima after the atom-bombing, who wrote a powerful piece of journalism, 'The Atomic Plague: I write this as a warning to the world'; and Martha Gellhorn, who described walking into the Dachau death camp at the end of the Second World War and documenting the horrors she saw – two revelatory and astonishing pieces of journalism.

As Chomsky and Herman argue in *Manufacturing Consent*, the mainstream media rarely give you the truth. Instead, they give you what powerful people want you to believe. As a rare truth teller in the mainstream media, like Wilfred Burchett before him, and the man he saw as his successor, Julian Assange, Pilger presented Australians with powerful counter-narratives to the war-mongering of our mainstream media and the ASPI-inspired propagandists of the ABC.

Pilger's earliest documentaries had David Munro as director and the pair had a long-term partnership which ended when Munro died in 1999 after making 20 documentaries with Pilger. Their entire team took great risks, smuggling cameras to film dissidents into military dictatorships like Burma and Timor Leste, a country where five Australian journalists were murdered in 1975. They were astoundingly brave.

Pilger wrote the scripts for the documentaries, and was the narrator and interviewer. His scripts were exemplars of modern journalism, adorned with an abundance of the most viscous irony, and a withering desire to expose the deceits of the mainstream journalism.

As front man, Pilger was handsome, eloquent, and his camera voice, though occasionally over-preachy, was magnificent even then, sounding like Moses descended from the mountain to chastise the worshippers of the Golden Calf.

The ghost of Julian Assange

Despite being detained, silenced, and hidden from public view in the maximum security Belmarsh prison for the past five years, as the day of his extradition draws near, the spectre of Julian Assange looms ever larger over the politics of the AUKUS

By exposing U.S. war crimes in Iraq in the searing documentary Collateral Murder, Assange, an Australian citizen, ignited a firestorm of controversy and earned the undying hatred of the U.S. and U.K. military intelligence community.

They and their Five Eyes collaborators have subjected this Australian citizen to unrelenting lawfare through the misuse of their courts for over a decade in a sickening travesty of that laughable contradiction, British justice.

As Assange's extradition approaches, as he prepares to transit from the frying pan of Belmarsh into the fire of a U.S. supermax, as his life hangs in the balance, Byron Bay filmmaker Kym Staton has been touring his new documentary, The Trust Fall: Julian Assange around Australia to rapturous acclaim.

The media release says the film is about the most famous political prisoner of our times, Julian Assange:

"Assange is a multiaward winning Australian journalist who has been detained in prison for more than 4.5 years and faces extradition to the U.S. with the threat of a 175-year prison sentence - all for revealing the truth."

The film examines the extraordinary significance of the documents released by WikiLeaks, the astonishing personal risk taken by Assange, the resulting

ruthless over-reaction by the spooks, and the broader fundamental threats posed to press freedom and our right to know.

It features a wide-ranging array of luminaries defending Assange, including Daniel Ellsberg, John Pilger, Tariq Ali and Chris Hedges, with the insights of experts including Jennifer Robertson, Jill Stein, Stephanie Morici and Nils Melzer, in addition to reflections of Assange's family, including Stella Assange, John Shipton and Gabriel Shipton.

The Brisbane launch of The Trust Fall: Julian Assange at the Five Star New Farm on 16th January was wildly successful. The film was intended to be screened in the purple room, the largest theatre in the New Farm complex, which holds over 200, so when that room sold out, they had to open a second theatre, which also sold out, so they opened a third room, which was almost full on the night!

Close to 400 people attended the opening night in Brisbane. Director Kym Staton was highly pleased with the turn out of the Brisbane premiere. "The response was overwhelming," he said.

The film has been exhibited at about a dozen festivals over the last six months. The world premiere in July at the Melbourne Documentary Film Festival, Nova Cinemas, Carlton, was sold out a week in advance. 240 people attended, and the theatre put on another screening the same night.

The Mareeba Drive-In was the first cinema to book the film, so Kym Staton and his co-producer Natalia Minana travelled to Mareeba in far north Queensland to attend the theatrical debut on 28th December. They had no

coming on the night of the screening because the drivein didn't do on-line ticket

They were pleased when they drove through the gates to see 108 cars - 215 people attending in a small country town! And at the end, they not only cheered and clapped, they also tooted their horns!

The reception in Brisbane lacked the horn tooting, but the applause was similarly Trust Fall: Julian Assange is a powerful and important documentary, imaginatively filmed and lyrically written. My favourite line from the script? "As the Mandela of our time walks a long walk toward freedom every day around a six-metre cell."

Jonathon Sri, who is the Greens candidate for Lord Mayor of Brisbane in the forthcoming city council He said:

"I guess two things that stuck out for me: just how hard the United States and their global empire will work to suppress the truth and to punish people who speak out.

"But I was also struck by the fact that in other parts of the world, people are paying a lot more attention to what's happening to Assange. And he's one of our guys. And yet, here in Australia, it doesn't quite resonate in the same way.

Assange said that if lies can start wars, truth can lead us to peace. Groups that represent the world's journalists, like the International Federation of Journalists, the MEAA, and Journalists Without Borders have warned the prosecution of Assange means the end of honest journalism.

We live in terrible times and witness crimes that are leading us towards a third world war. At the same time, the mainstream media and

our politicians are the vectors for these war-provoking lies: Anthony Albanese, Penny Wong, Peter Dutton, Simon Birmingham, the Murdoch press, Channel 9, the ABC, are the problem, not the solution, because they blithely ignore the mistreatment of this Australian citizen by our allegedly closest allies.

For them, Julian Assange is the unwelcome ghost of any integrity they once possessed.

What can be done? It depends on us, the people of Australia. Contact your federal MP and express your concerns and urge them to join the Bring Julian Assange Home Parliamentary Group.


The screenings of The Trust Fall: Julian Assange are steadily expanding. If you

Female leadership key to traumatised community 'saving itself'

s the two-year anniversary of the devastating Northern Rivers' flooding looms, new research by social work researchers from the University of Newcastle has shown the female-led response to the trauma prevailed where authorities failed.

Data from interviews with members of the Northern Rivers community following the event has revealed that the community-based response was spontaneous yet hugely sophisticated in its mobilisation. Unexpected findings show responsive leadership was predominantly undertaken by women.

Lead author and social worker, Associate Professor Wendy Foote, said the findings were an important representation of a region still grieving. "We know from the 2022 NSW Floods Inquiry that there was a gross failure of preparedness and negligence in the support offered to the Northern Rivers region," Associate Professor Foote said.

The huge gap left by the government's inability to respond to the event was filled by female community members who mobilised as the region rallied to 'save itself', including key coordination on social media through Resilience Lismore; the harnessing of Indigenous approaches to trauma and healing via services such as the Healing Hub; and the provision of resources through locations such as the Koori Mail hub, all led by women.

Associate Professor Foote emphasises that two years on from the devastating events, "it's imperative we continue to advocate for better policies and procedures to prevent the same failures ever happening again."

An expert in responses to disasters and climate change, co-author Professor Margaret Alston OAM said that historical understanding of trauma events was often gendered.

"Historically, women bear the burden of labour and the health impacts of disasters," Professor Alston said. "That's not to diminish the efforts of men in these circumstances but can be due to the nurturing or support roles women often take on in response to

trauma," she said.
"In this case, the
work-load imbalance,
threats to self and
property and trauma
impacts were very
gendered. Women
undertook the bulk
of unpaid work in the
immediate response and
stayed in support roles for
extended periods following
the initial emergency," she
said.

The research report proposes several recommendations for policy makers, as well as for those working in support roles. In recognition of the volunteer efforts, the researchers are calling for a disaster fund to acknowledge the huge personal and monetary losses of undertaking this type of work moving forward.

"Those in social work positions and support roles (whether formal or informal) are totally shattered by these experiences. Not only are they supporting others, but they are living the crisis, completely unsupported, themselves too," Associate Professor Foote explained.

"This is not an uncommon response to community-driven mobilisation. Women often play a significant role in post-trauma healing, and we'd like to see funding to support those efforts," she said.

Sick to the stomach

The research investigated the themes of Good Health and Wellbeing, and Gender Equality, two of the United Nations Sustainability Goals (United Nations (2015).

The study that found women were increasingly subject to sexual assault and domestic violence after a natural



and in the wake of the 2022 Northern Rivers floods.

Tamara Smith MP, Greens Disaster Relief Spokesperson said, "Reading the accounts of women in my community experiencing domestic violence, abuse, and sexual assault in evacuation centres after the floods is shocking ... I felt sick to my stomach."

Abigail Boyd, Greens spokesperson for Gendered Violence and Abuse, said, "Given the chronic underfunding of domestic and family violence and sexual violence frontline services in our State, and the lack of prioritisation that successive governments have given to these issues, it is sadly not surprising to hear these reports of sexual violence experienced in the aftermath of the NSW floods.

"Enough is enough — we're calling on the Labor government to ensure this is the last time the needs of women and girls are ignored in a crisis."

The Greens are calling on the NSW Government to implement all of the University of Newcastle study's eight key recommendations.

That includes fully funding local recovery services and prioritising

community-led solutions from women and First Nations peoples. Ms Smith said, "The government must treat this issue seriously and ensure each and every point raised by this study is addressed."

Roadside Drug Testing will have to be on the agenda of course, and I look forward to hearing how the five Legalise Cannabis MPs are getting on trying to make changes.

"Drug drivers, speedsters ripping our state and families apart." That was the front page of the Daily Terror a few weeks ago. Then another one a few days later with similar stuff and a senior cop staring out of the pages labelling NSW drivers as a "bunch of selfish bastards".

The new statistics detailed how one in every six roadside drug tests carried out this year in NSW has resulted in someone being caught, compared to the 230 roadside breath tests it takes on average to detect one drink driver.

Of course there is no mention of them targeting previously busted drug drivers. If you've been busted once, expect to be tested again and again. The only way

someone like your Auntie's name, as a friend just did.

"While speed had been a key factor in the weekend's crashes, drug driving is a rising issue. When you start looking at where the community's going and our society is going, the presence of drugs is emerging as one of our biggest challenges," Asst Commissioner McFadden said.

I wonder how much of it was a kickback against us trying to allow prescribed medical patients to drive? These limits personally infuriate me because it's pushing everyone to get legal weed via a doctor, forcing us into their system, when we could be growing our

People are free to drive so long as they are unimpaired in Tassie and the ACT, and the rest of the planet!

RDT has become a huge hurdle we cannot get over at the moment in NSW. No wonder mushrooms and LSD are booming again, you don't get tested driving with them in your system. Nor with any opiates of course, because that's Big Pharma's cash cow.

It just has to be about impairment, whether it's from any type of drugs, or mix of drugs, or old age, or mental health. Testing for sobriety makes total sense and we already have a law in place to do that, I'm told. The cops are dodging responsibility and want a machine to do it for them, like a breathalyser, rather than have to think

Hopefully Dr David Bearman is coming to MardiGrass again this year and we can hear first-hand how they deal with drug driving in America. Some States report a clear drop in car accidents after legalising weed, possibly because less alcohol is consumed.

Every aspect of our favourite plant will be discussed again on the first weekend in May. Growing indoors and out, extracting, refining, cooking, industrial, medical, recreational, call it what you like. If experience is the true teacher, MardiGrass is Weed University.

We are expecting a big crowd because so many people now have the herb legally and finally can freely carry and use it. Do pick up any hitch hikers on the way won't you, because that is their only risk in coming to MardiGrass now.

There are things you can do to help make it a joyous weekend for everyone. Maybe you want to billet someone in your spare room; we have speakers coming from around the country.



t seems everyone I know is in the middle of a major transformation. Some are forced to change, some choose to change. If you are forced into a new situation the change is by nature challenging, even painful. If change is your

mean it isn't challenging.


